THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD

My Journey to a Gold Award



On 10 May, I was invited to Buckingham Palace for the Duke of Edinburgh's Gold Award Celebration Event. It was a great event, with tea and cake for all in attendance, capped off with a speech from the Duke of Edinburgh, Prince Edward, and a handful of inspirational speakers throughout the afternoon. Standing on the pristine lawn in front of the palace, I thought back to when I was in Year 9, lining up with my group to start our first practice. Since then, lots has changed. Student to member of staff; hiking boots and large bag to smart shoes and a lanyard. In the years that followed, I completed Bronze, Silver and Gold. This amounted to 12 months of working on skills, 21 months of volunteering, 21 months of completing my physical section, and a week-long residential.

The expeditions totalled 9 days of walking and 6 nights in tents. Across this period, I learnt the importance of good teamwork, communication, and resilience. These skills have been invaluable throughout my time as a student at BFS, through my GCSEs and A levels, and as a member of staff this year. Most importantly, all the expeditions were great fun, even if it did not feel that way when we were soaked through at the top of a mountain in Wales! I would encourage anyone who is considering signing up to any of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award levels for next year to go for it and see where it can take you!




10 House Points!





Year 7 Mind Maps





EXTRA CURRICULAR



Flying Start Challenge



The Flying Start Challenge is a renowned engineering competition, established to develop key skills and increase awareness of the careers available within the engineering industry. Its aim is for teams of four students to collaborate on the design, build and test of a model glider in order to compete in a regional schools' 'Fly-Off'. Mentored by leading advisers in the aerospace industry, including the main sponsor, Leonardo UK, school teams fly their glider and are judged on the distance flown alongside a poster presentation detailing their design decisions.

Year 8s, Andrew, Joseph, Hayden and Dexter, formed team Case O'Clan and qualified for the Grand Final, held at Aerospace Bristol last Friday. The team spent the day competing with twenty other schools on STEM tasks to score points. Activities included building the tallest structure using straws, devising the best method in launching a missile (starburst sweet), and designing a vehicle that could harness wind power for propulsion. To show their aeronautical learning they made a poster and gave a presentation to a panel of judges.

They discussed extremely competently, and the judges were impressed by their ability to talk about and answer questions on complex principles - it is clear they put in a lot of time and effort, and they scored the highest in the poster competition because of this.

During the day, the team launched their gliders in the hangar where the one of the Concorde aeroplanes rests. It was a tough competition and the team performed well. They took away with them the opportunity to meet like-minded engineering students and young graduates from many of the aeronautical industries in Bristol.


