MOMENTS MATTER, ATTENDANCE COUNTS.

BLACK HISTOPH MONTH

Every year schools in the UK celebrate Black History Month during October. The recognition for this event came originally from America following the dedication of Carter G Woodson who had devoted his life to promoting Black history within schools. This was adopted into the UK in 1987 following work by Ghanaian born Akyaaba Addai-Sebo who had seen the impact in America and wanted similar for the UK.

People from African and Caribbean backgrounds have been a fundamental part of British history for centuries, but campaigners believe their contributions have often been overlooked and Black History Month seeks to raise awareness, whilst promoting and celebrating this contribution.

Each year Black History Month takes a different focus and this year the focus is *Reclaiming Narratives*. The history of Black communities has been told through lenses that often misrepresent, oversimplify, or entirely overlook the rich and diverse experiences of those who lived it. This year's focus is a call to action for story tellers, historians and custodians to highlight the breadth of this culture. Next week's assemblies will be on this topic.

Students are being invited to contribute towards the assemblies – in content or active participation. They are also being asked to enter a <u>House competition</u> where they can submit an essay, poem or artwork about someone well known or known personally to them.

One of the core priorities for the School is to fully embed our value of *mutual respect* with every student feeling that their voice and story can be heard within the community. Our focus during Black History Month is part of that but should not be a standalone event – instead Black history is being considered across all areas of the curriculum and school life on an ongoing basis. Students will be shown in assemblies how the School is doing this throughout the curriculum every year.

#### HOLIDAYS

New attendance law does not allow schools to authorise family holidays. Please do not book holidays in term time. They are highly disruptive to your child's education. As a school, we work with Bristol City Council to issue PCN fines and prosecutions to parents who take their children on holiday during term time.

A Penalty Notice can be issued for unauthorised absences once there are a minimum of 10 session (5 days) within a 10-week period. The Penalty Notice can be issued per parent, per child. The Penalty Notice amount is £160 if paid within 28 days. However, this will be reduced to £80 if paid within 21 days.

For a second Penalty Notice issued within a 3-year rolling period to the same parent in respect of the same child, the Penalty Notice is £160 if paid within 28 days. There is no option for this second offence to be reduced to the lower rate of £80.

If a Penalty Notice remains unpaid after 28 days, then the parent may be prosecuted for failing to secure regular school attendance.

A third Penalty Notice cannot be issued to the same parent for the same child within a 3-year rolling period. Should the parent continue to incur further unauthorised absences then alternative action will be considered, which could include a prosecution for failing to secure regular school attendance.

Please note that parents who repeatedly take unauthorised absences below the threshold of 5 days will also be considered for penalty notices.

#### Year 12

We have welcomed a bunch of very enthusiastic Year 12 students to Sociology this term!

With Ms Tovey, they have learned about the fundamentals of the key sociological perspectives that we continually revisit throughout the course: functionalism, Marxism, feminism and the New Right.

With Ms Norton, they have started to explore the role of education in society according to these perspectives - whether it truly teaches us to be an upstanding member of society or if it simply prepares us to be a mere cog in the capitalist machine.

As part of an independent learning project, students have also been reading a book from the Social Science Library to deepen their understanding and explore an area of interest. I am looking forward to seeing the academic posters they produce on these after half term!

#### YEAR 13



Year 13 have impressed us since coming back, getting right into the swing of revision for the upcoming set of mock exams. They have explored some difficult theoretical elements of Sociology, such as the extent to which we can call Sociology a science and grappled with concepts such as 'falsification' and 'verificationism' with determination. They have also continued studying different methods of research in Sociology and how they might apply them to studying education. Finally, they have started their big, optional Year 2 topic: The Media. They have conducted a content analysis of the news, tallying how many stories are 'serious journalism' compared to 'pop culture' and the reasons why media organisations may embed so much of this pop culture. It has been amazing to see them come to life reflecting on their own media consumption and usage! We wish them luck in their upcoming mocks.

#### Bikeability cycle training for schools & youth groups
