ATTENDANCE PERCENTAGES

As Term 1 draws to a close, please check your child's attendance on the *My Child At School* app. Please remember that attendance percentages are not like exam scores. For an attendance record to be good, it needs to be 96% or more.

An attendance record of 90% means that your child is missing the equivalent of one day a fortnight. An attendance record of 80% means that your child is missing the equivalent of one day a week.

Here are some easy ways to improve an attendance record:

- 1.Do not book holidays in term time. Even the "odd day" at the beginning or end of a term can make a huge difference to your child's education.
- 2. Book medical appointments outside of school hours. If you do have to take an appointment within school hours, make sure that your child attends school before and after the appointment. Remember that being in school at 8.30am and 1.20pm will mean receiving the legal registration marks.
- 3.NHS guidance states that children can attend school with minor illnesses such as coughs and colds. If a student is a little under the weather, you can still send them to school!
- 4. Restrict screen time in the evenings. This will result in better sleep and students are more likely to attend the next day.
- 5. Being punctual helps students that arrive late after 9am receive an unauthorised mark for the morning!

Year 13 Geography Trip to Pembrokeshire

Our Sixth Form NEA residential is one of the biggest events of the year for the Geography Department at BFS. Last week our Year 13 students travelled to beautiful Pembrokeshire in Wales to gather fieldwork data which they will use within their NEA coursework. They developed their statistical and GIS skills under the guidance of expert FSC tutors.



Despite the drizzly weather, students developed their physical fieldwork skills in St Bride's Bay. They tried out new methods of data collection, such as cliff profiling and a bipolar analysis to explore the impacts of coastal processes and the effectiveness and sustainability of coastal management strategies.



Our Geographers also developed their human geography fieldwork skills in the beautiful coastal town of Tenby. Trying out new methods, such as emotion-mapping and non-participant observation, they explored the extent to which factors such as globalisation and changes in industry have shaped Tenby over time and how these changes affect how locals perceive their hometown.



We were so impressed with the enthusiasm and engagement that the students showed, getting stuck in to their fieldwork and skills workshops. They made the most of learning new skills and engaging in some geography-in-action. Well done, Geographers!

Year 8 Life Sciences Trip

On Tuesday, some of our fantastic Year 8 students were invited to the University of Bristol Life Sciences 10 Year Anniversary party! We were treated to a behind the scenes look at the labs and the projects the students are currently working on, complete with loads of practical activities.

First up, we looked at the specimen and skeleton collections, with over 20,000 items in store! We held a real whale vertebrae and elephant's teeth. We examined the different camouflage and adaptations of predators and prey, and matched habitats to the animal skeletons. Next, we studied flowers and plants under a microscope, something that we have been practicing recently in school, followed by counting colonies of indicator species to see how clean the local River Frome is. Citizen Science in action!



To end the visit, we walked around the numerous stalls and projects, with some amazing examples including sabre tooth tiger skulls, bat detectors, mammal poo and best of all, a robot dog!

A huge thank you to the University for inviting us and a huge well done to our students for asking really thoughtful questions and amazing the staff with their species knowledge!

Year 13 History, Politics and Sociology Trip

On Wednesday, Year 13 History, Politics and Sociology students visited London for a full day of activities. We arrived in London at 9.30am to begin our day with a visit to Westminster and a tour of the Houses of Parliament. We had some very knowledgeable tour guides who told us about the history of the building as well as the lawmaking process. We were able to visit the House of Lords, but unfortunately, as it was Wednesday, Prime Minister's Questions were about to begin and so we were unable to visit the House of Commons. This did mean though, that some of our students were able to observe the Speaker's procession which saw Sir Lindsay Hoyle's entrance to the House of Commons.

Following our tour, we took the Thames Clipper from Westminster Pier down the River Thames to the Tower of London which was an opportunity for students to take in the many sights that London has to offer. The History students then went to the Tower of London for the next stage of their trip and a Wars of the Roses seminar. We started with a classroom-based session on how useful sources are, framed around the key question - is the Tower of London a useful source?

Following much discussion, we were then taken on a guided tour of the Tower and its grounds. We witnessed the site of the murder of Henry VI (if you believe Oxford and Cambridge scholars) and were treated to a Shakespearean performance of Richard III from two of our students. Students really enjoyed the day, and it really cemented their knowledge of the Wars of the Roses.

The Sociology and Politics students took a walk past St Paul's Cathedral to the Central Criminal Court (more commonly known as the Old Bailey), where they sat in the public galleries to observe the court proceedings of some of the most high-profile cases in the country at the moment. Students behaved impeccably throughout and were a credit to the school.

Check Mates by Stewart Foster Review by Stanley, Year 7

This is one of the best books I've read! It's about a boy named Felix, who has ADHD and finds it hard to focus at school or do anything right without messing up. His grades are bad, he gets in trouble, and it feels like everything is falling apart. His Mum doesn't know what to do, so she sends him to spend time with his grandad.

At first, Felix isn't happy about it because his grandad is strict and old-fashioned. Plus, Felix thinks chess is boring, and that's all his grandad wants to teach him. But as Felix learns more about chess, he realises that the game is teaching him to focus and think about life in a different way. It helps him calm down, and he starts improving at school and getting along with his friends better.



I liked the way the author made Felix's character feel so real. His ADHD isn't something that magically goes away, but the way he learns to handle it with chess is inspiring. I liked how the story shows that even though people seem very different, they can still help each other in unexpected ways.

Overall, "Check Mates" is a funny, touching, and exciting book. It's about family, friendship, and not giving up, even when things are hard. I'd definitely recommend it to anyone, especially if you like stories about learning new skills and finding out what you're capable of!



Naughts and Crosses by Malorie Blackman Review by Jasmine, Year 9

This book is an incisive, thought-provoking novel that intricately scrutinises complexities of race, identity and a forbidden love. The dystopian genre where prejudice rules without question between the privileged Crosses and marginalised Noughts provides a tense, unpredictable atmosphere. The narrative centres a tumultuous relationship between Sephy, a Cross and Callum, a Naught. The once required vanity between the lovers begins to fade with the family rivalry and opposite backgrounds. Their love, fraught with societal condemnation, serves as a reflection that accompanies this harsh antagonism.

Blackmans's prose is both compelling and unique, immersing readers in the emotional aspect of each character. The narrative unfolds meticulously, each chapter revealing the profound struggle they endure against the backdrop of

systematic inequality. The exploration of prejudice and injustice is executed with exceptional sensitivity, transforming the novel into not only a love story, but a profound calamity waiting to be discovered.

Overall, the book is far above expectation providing a perfect read for both teenagers and adults. The book challenges the reader to confront their own pre-conceptions and consider the ramifications of societal oppression. I wholeheartedly bestow five stars for its emotional resonance, relevance and masterful storytelling!

If you love the book as much as I do, why stop there? Noughts and Crosses is the first book of a wonderful series worthy of reading!

The Curriculum has also changed its structure, with all students across Years 7-11 starting with **striking and** *fielding* units of work, and they have been fantastic - just take a look at the pictures!

Students spent the first two lessons focussing on the *Physical Me*. They have learned the fundamental movements used in rounders and cricket and have transferred their knowledge and practice across both sports.

The next two lessons focussed on the *Creative Me*, where students started to apply tactics and strategies in game play, using their Physical Me skills to support with them in outwitting their opponents!

Lesson five was all about the **Social Me** - rules, umpiring and teamwork! We saw much success, as students engaged in making sure fairness was applied to game play and worked collaboratively to support their own team as well as others.

Thinking Me was embedded into Lesson 6, as we looked at assessment. Students were challenged cognitively to think about all their learning from the term with questioning and quizzing through game play. Reflecting on their own performance and sharing ideas and understanding with other members of their class.

A super start to the school year in PE! We are excited to see how students apply their learning of the **four me's** to the rest of the sports on the Curriculum.

As we move into Term 2, students will now branch off into a variety of different activities in the following units <u>(please see the timetables)</u>:

Net and wall: Badminton and volleyball / table tennis Invasion 1: Netball and basketball

Invasion 2: Touch rugby and indoor hockey (shin pads required) **Aesthetics:** Gymnastics and dance combined (bare foot - grip socks are not allowed)
