As Term 4 draws to a close, please check your child's attendance on the My Child At School app. Please remember that attendance percentages are not like exam scores. For an attendance record to be good, it needs to be 96% or more.

An attendance record of **90%** means that your child has missed the equivalent of **one day a fortnight**. An attendance record of **80%** means that your child has missed the equivalent of **one day a week**.

Here are some easy ways to improve attendance:

- 1.Do not book holidays in term time. Even the "odd day" at the beginning or end of a term can make a huge difference to your child's education.
- 2. Book medical appointments outside of school hours. If you do have to make an appointment within school hours, make sure that your child attends school before and after the appointment. Remember that being in school at 8.30am and 1.20pm will mean receiving the legal registration marks.
- 3. NHS guidance states that children can attend school with minor illnesses such as coughs and colds. If a student is a little under the weather, you can still send them to school.
- 4. Restrict screen time in the evenings. Your child will sleep better and are more likely to attend the next day.
- 5. Being punctual helps students that arrive late (after 9am) receive an unauthorised mark for the morning.

If you have any attendance issues, please phone 0117 9597200 and ask to speak to the attendance office. We can help with lots of problems and can refer issues onto other relevant departments or teachers.

We are delighted to announce that BFS has been awarded the Bristol Healthy Schools Essential Award. Mr East, along with other members of the school community, have worked hard to ensure that the school has in place the essential ingredients needed to make a healthy school. This includes a focus on healthy eating, physical activity, supporting positive mental health and providing quality PSHE lessons.

Bristol Healthy Schools

Highlights of the school's work:

- Using a variety of innovative ways to develop an understanding of the health and wellbeing needs of the school population through regular surveys with pupils, families, staff; staff forums; ensuring the curriculum is student focused for instance in PE, Food Technology or PSHE regularly discussing health and wellbeing issues; and designing lessons for lots of oracy and discussion so that feedback from students is a consistent part of every lesson.
- Implementing a behaviour system that is trauma-informed and picks up on students struggling and seeks to support and not just sanction.
- Ensuring school food is healthier and more sustainable, with canteen providers presenting to students and gathering feedback from the student leadership team.
- Having tiered mental wellbeing support in place (wellbeing service, Anna Freud online services, School Nurse & School counsellor).
- Reviewing and developing all areas of equalities support.
- Ensuring PSHE topics are covered across the curriculum (e.g. Drama performance teaching about menstruation through its 'period drama', English exploring themes like race, discrimination, and various equalities-based issues).

In Year 9 Spanish, we have been developing our understanding of the essential verb '**gustar**' and how to use it accurately when referring to singular and plural food and drink items. This is great retrieval from Year 8.

We have also developed our knowledge of pronouns to be able to refer to other people's opinions. We have spent lots of time using mini whiteboards and doing error correction tasks to master this verb in lesson time and we have been categorising and coding to help boost our level of understanding. We now have lots of clear notes about how to accurately use '*gustar*' and other verb phrases that work in the same way. Well done for your focus and hard work with this concept so far, Year 9!



Year 10 students have recently started the topic of 'My lifestyle', learning about food, healthy diet and routine habits. We have extended our previous knowledge about food items and described a daily routine about type of meals or eating habits by learning and comparing these with other Spanish speaking countries. This took us to describe a type of healthy diet, eating routines and creating dialogue and conversation in class using more complex grammar structures used to give opinions and recommendations in Spanish. *¿Llevas una vida sana?*

It's revision time! We have wrapped up all our content for Year 11 and have started revising in earnest, focussing on the four papers and their different skills. Students have looked at the past tense again, to make sure they can give at least three examples and then practising past paper questions, focussing on sharing top tips for success for both Foundation and Higher tier. Miss Coleman's favourite phrase has never been more apt:

Trabaja duro en silencio y deja que tu éxito haga todo el ruido - Work hard in silence and let your success make the noise! We wish Year 11 all the best for the coming exam period, you can do it!

The class spent one lesson revising a tense, the second lesson preparing their presentations, and their third lesson presenting.

This is an incredible success as the French system is rigorous and highly competitive. Theo had the added difficulty of not having French as his first language, meaning that even being offered a place is an outstanding achievement in itself. We wish Theo all the best in his studies in France next year!

Applying to a French university was not something I did without a lot of thought. To leave the idea of UCAS and the school's support system when applying was frustrating as the whole UK university application is comparatively simple, but nevertheless I'm now very happy with the outcome. Along with a UCAS application, I used an equivalent service to apply to Univsersité Grenoble Alpes (UGA), and after a lot of administrative work, and a French level test done in London to prove my skills, I have had my place officially accepted. This means that I'll be starting university in Grenoble, France this September, studying Economics and Management. Although there's still lots of work to be done (visa, accommodation etc.), I'm really excited about it and cannot wait to get back to the mountains. After spending last summer there learning French and doing bike racing, I got to know the area well and knew I wanted to spend more time there. with friends in the region, the significantly lower fees, and the fact it is a globally highly ranked university, UGA seemed like an easy choice. Thank you to the French teachers at BFS for helping me with the application, and if there is anyone interested in doing something similar and not sure where to start, I'd be happy to help.

The Death Cure by James Dashner Review by Amelia, Year 7

Running the maze is over. The Scorch Trials are over. But Wicked's mind games and lies are not. Thomas thought it would be over. Done. Finished! He was wrong.

The Death Cure is the third book in this amazing series full of hope, dare and adventure. It tells of how Wicked are fighting to get a cure. 5 years ago, the sun flares landed on the planet - destroying land and billions of lives. It released a terrible, terrible virus. It spreads like wild-fire and makes you slowly go mad until you go so mad that you jump off a cliff or pick a fight for a dead human body (food). You don't win. Wicked plans to get a cure. Wicked is good (or so they say). They have implanted a small device in each subject's brain, this allows Wicked to track their subject's (like Thomas) thoughts and emotions. Because the virus targets the brain, they are looking at the brains of people who are immune their subjects. Will Wicked get the cure?



This book highlights the phrase: 'there is no such thing as black and white'. It means that it's not as simple as good and evil. It means that there may not be a 'right' choice or a 'happy ending'. It's just a matter of what you would rather lose.

This novel is written really, really well. The tone of the book is perfect for its content: ominous but with hope and humor.

My mind was racing when reading this: I was trying to figure out who was in the right and who was in the wrong. I still don't think I know if I have. After all, desperate times call for desperate measures!

Still one question remains unanswered: Is Wicked good?

On Friday 28 March, 8 well-read students from Years 7 and 8 faced nearly 20 other schools from across the country to compete in the National Reading Champions Competition. This was a live online quiz lasting nearly 2 and a half hours and consisted of 70 questions all about books, characters, authors, fictional settings, awards and more. There was the video clue round, the anagram round, the geographical round to name a few.



BFS entered two teams, and both pulled together and collaborated beautifully by sharing their reading knowledge and helping teammates out. Out of 26 teams we placed 12th and 13th. The eight team members ate five packets of biscuits, and everyone had a wonderful time sharing their joy in reading. Well done to Henry H, Charlie S, Naomi H, Esther J, Ava A, Adea M, Bethany G and Kirstie C for your love of reading, and your fantastic effort on the day.

Last week, Emily, Alice and Imaan were at the Faculty of Engineering at UWE competing in the Flying Start Challenge regional finals. There were around twenty other teams from local schools.

This event started in November last year and was open to all Year 8 students who signed up for the challenge. Local aeronautical graduates from MBDA came to BFS and presented the Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) activity. They learnt the basics of flying and had the task of designing and building a glider, collaboratively in a team, using a range of materials from balsa wood to recycled materials. The three, called **The** *Reds*, qualified on the day to represent BFS.

During the course of the day at UWE, there were tasks to perform, such as building a tower using only paper straws (The Reds did very well creating the tallest tower in the room, measuring 1.87m); designing and making a balloon powered vehicle; presenting a poster that they made for the day showing their knowledge of flight and quizzed by a panel of judges.

They were given a tour of the Digital Studio with aeroplanes to fly on flight simulators and F1 cars to drive strapped in full motion simulation machines. In another area of the studio, stepping into a special room wearing purpose made 3D glasses enabled them to navigate and experience a virtual house like the holodeck in Star Trek. They were able to investigate the virtual space by pointing a handheld cursor. This very expensive equipment can be used in the design process where interacting in architectural landscapes can be achieved before it has been built.

The Reds had a great time interrelating with other like-minded students, absorbing the atmosphere of university life and taking away experiences to look back on in the future.

CAREERS



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We were very lucky this week to welcome Simon Wales, Chief Executive of Bristol Beacon, to give an employer talk about the central Bristol arts and entertainment venue and what his role involves. Previously known as Colston Hall, Simon explained how the venue had reopened 18 months ago after being closed for five years and benefiting from a multi-million pound refurbishment.

It is now the main music venue in Bristol, offering a wide range of musical genres to the public, from metal and jazz to classical and folk, as well as serving as a venue for many other events including weddings, graduation



ceremonies and conferences. Bristol Beacon is a charity, meaning all its profits are put back into developing the venue and its work – which also acts as an education hub, running a lot of music services, including the provision of music teachers to students at local schools, one of which is BFS.

While stressing that there are no set entry routes into the live entertainment business, Simon told students that an interest in a wide range of music would be helpful, as well as getting as much experience as possible, for example helping on school shows or getting involved in organising other events like weddings.

He also talked about his own career path: he had a love for music from a young age, played cello in the school orchestra and sang in the school choir, before going to university to study English Literature, where he got involved in the music scene and university clubs and societies. His first job was in the post room at Warner Records, and from there he has gone on to work for and run a number of music venues and orchestras.

Simon took students through the different jobs at Bristol Beacon that they might be interested in exploring further: lighting and sound, digital marketing and content creation, musicians (most of whom are freelance), and front of house management.

There were lots of questions at the end and some students stayed afterwards to quiz Simon further about opportunities in the sector. Many thanks to Simon for giving up his time to come and talk to us.
