Penalty Notices and Prosecutions for Irregular Attendance and Unauthorised Lates

School attendance is really important which is why we take attendance seriously at BFS. Recent research has shown that good attendance is strongly linked both to outcomes at GCSE and future earnings. We expect students to attend for 96% or above of the year.

We work with Bristol City Council to fine and prosecute parents and carers for unauthorised absences. This can be for being late after the register closes at 9am, unauthorised holidays, school refusal and other unauthorised reasons.

Current fines are:

- 1st offence in a rolling 3-year period: £80 per parent per child (rising to £160 if not paid within 21 days).
- 2nd offence in a rolling 3-year period: £160 per parent per child.
- 3rd offence in a rolling 3-year period: prosecution or other legal measures will be considered. Prosecution can lead to fines of up to £2500, 3 months' imprisonment and a criminal record.

These measures are usually taken for 10 or more unauthorised absences (10 half days) within a ten-week period; however, fines will also be considered for parents and carers who repeatedly take unauthorised holidays below this threshold.

At BFS we prefer to take a supportive approach to attendance before using legal measures, so please contact the Attendance Office if you are worried about your child's attendance. MOMENTS MATTER, ATTENDANCE COUNTS.

Ada's Design

My balloon design celebrates Bristol's culture as balloons are an iconic part of Bristol. The balloon fiesta celebrates Bristol and brings all cultures together from across the city. I created the sunlight and balloons by colouring and shaping fondant icing. I piped the chocolate detail.

READING AGE ASSESSMENTS (ACCELERATED READER "STAR TEST")

Across three weeks (2 – 20 June), all students in Year 7, Year 8 and Year 9 will undergo their final reading age assessment of the year, during their English lessons. It is an online, multiple-choice assessment lasting approximately 20 minutes, which students do not need to revise or prepare for. These have been scheduled so that no student will take their Accelerated Reader assessment during their year group's end of year subject assessment period, ensuring students are not overwhelmed.

Please encourage your student to give this assessment their best effort as the data is instrumental in helping us allocate interventions and support. We also use the data to inform curriculum planning for subsequent academic years. Parents will soon receive a letter with further details.

The presentations were designed focussing on the cognitive (content) and linguistic (vocabulary) strands of oracy and students spent their preparation time learning new words such as "ball pit" and "snack room". The popular designs featured multiple sports facilities, and they even included lots of conditional tense when explaining what their perfect schools would have! Fantastic work Year 7, bringing design and Spanish together in some wonderful confident presentations.







Last week we had visitors from the Police's Southwest Cyber Prevent Team come to school to talk to Year 9 about their computer use. The talk focused on elements of the Computer Misuse Act, and how, often accidentally, laws can be broken. The Southwest Cyber Prevent Team work with young people at risk of



breaking the law - the focus is on education and measures to prevent cyber-crime. The aim is to educate young people on the possible consequences of their actions.

The RCCU has a dedicated cyber security team that works with schools to promote cyber safety measures and reduce the risk of cyber-crime. Safer Schools Officers regularly work within schools to promote safety and prevent crime. The students looked at hacking and how accessing other people's devices and accounts can be illegal. They also looked at how using mods for gaming can also be a legal grey area. The students considered various scenarios and discussed them with each other and as a group. We were able to get all seven tutor groups through on a rotation, it was a busy but useful day. The school is looking forward to inviting our visitors back next year.

Ms Freeman set two Year 7 classes the task of writing an article or making a poster informing staff, parents and students at BFS of the importance of pollination and to describe the process of how pollination occurs. Article by Ollie W and George: Pollen is the male sex cell in plants and is very important for sexual reproduction within plants. Pollination is when pollen travels to another flower and fertilises with an ovule. Pollen travels in two ways, insects and wind. This means that bees have an important role of carrying pollen throughout flowers. This is a key part of how plants reproduce. The bee population is declining because of intensive farming, pesticides and loss of habitat. This leads to a decrease in the population of bees because of the lack of habitats and high number of pesticides. Plants are the main producers of all food chains. As a result of Bee numbers declining, plants aren't reproducing as much. This has a knock-on effect on the rest of the food chain eventually leading to an effect on us humans. As humans we can make an impact by using less pesticides. You could also make an impact yourself by building these habitats in your garden or planting wildflowers, which are essential for the populations across the world.

Salters Festival of Chemistry Competition

Last Thursday an elite group of cracking chemists represented BFS at the annual Salters Chemistry Competition. Toby, Josh, Dan, Amelia, Lena, Nina-Mae and Katherine were amazing at tackling a tough practical task - synthesising aspirin which is usually a Sixth Form experiment! They all enjoyed using the exciting undergraduate labs with unfamiliar equipment, especially donning professional lab coats, gloves and goggles.

We also listened to an engaging career talk about how Chemistry (and STEM subjects) can be used in some unexpected careers as well as learning about the fascinating applications of Chemistry in the pharmaceutical labs at the University. We had such a fab day out and we're really looking forward to participating again next year!

The last Employer Talk of this term was given by pharmacist, Helen Ireland. Her talk covered a definition of pharmacy, what pharmacy professionals do, where they work, and how to become a pharmacy professional.



Helen explained that, as well as being about the science or practice of the preparation and dispensing of medical drugs, pharmacy is about so much more, including: making a positive difference to people's lives and wellbeing, stopping people from getting sick by helping to support them with healthy lifestyles, being part of communities, being part of new developments in healthcare and providing care in a wide range of settings.

The pharmacy professional role involves a wide variety of tasks and activities, meaning that no day is the same. As well as dispensing and labelling medication, pharmacists can expect to diagnose minor illnesses, check prescriptions, manage medical supplies, provide information and advice, administer vaccines, manage clinical trials, and so much more. They work in a range of settings, not just the high street pharmacy, including hospitals, GP surgeries, care homes, vaccination centres and hospices. There are also jobs for pharmacy professionals in the pharmaceutical industry, on the 111 helpline, in journalism, prisons and the armed forces, as well as at festivals. Helen herself has worked at Glastonbury, where she got free entry and accommodation (with showers!) alongside dispensing medication and giving clinical advice to festival goers.

In addition to giving an interesting insight into the profession, Helen gave students lots of useful information about how to get into pharmacy. She took them through the key skills they need to develop, such as communication, empathy, attention to detail, problem-solving, and a good knowledge of maths, science and IT. She also talked about the qualifications needed to become a pharmacist, which include A Levels in science subjects, in particular chemistry, and a four or five year Masters degree, followed by twelve months training and an exam. There are also opportunities to become a pharmacy technician, which is a more practical, supporting role, a pharmacy assistant or a science manufacturing technician. Helen showed us an inspiring video about the crucial role the pharmacy department plays as part of the multi-disciplinary team in the University Hospitals Bristol and Weston NHS Trust. There were lots of questions at the end, possibly prompted by the offer of an NHS highlighter pen for anyone who was brave enough to be curious!

We are really grateful to Helen for coming in to speak to our students - thank you!
