## Understanding the Impacts of Smartphones on Bristol's Children

At a recent talk held locally by <u>Smartphone Free Childhood</u> and <u>Papaya</u>, the following facts were shared:

- The average UK child spends 3 hours 48 mins a day online. That is 26.6 hours a week, 58 days a year, 11 years 67 days over a lifetime.
- Pre-teens lose the equivalent of a night's sleep per week to social media and 73% of teenagers take their phone to bed with them.
- 1 in 5 children are bullied online and young people aged 16-24 are the loneliest group in society.
- 94% of children are exposed to porn by age 14 and the average first exposure to porn is whilst doing homework at age 12.

## **Cashless Catering**

We are changing our cashless catering system from Civica to Cunninghams. The new system will allow us to continue with the development of the school meal service, and will provide us with a more efficient, faster and ultimately better quality of service.

No changes will be required on your part however we will be scanning students' fingers/thumbs (for those that have given consent) over the coming weeks.

Please rest assured that this information is strongly encrypted using the highestgrade encryption standards.

## **Medical Appointments**

Where possible, please book routine medical appointments outside of school hours – even a few missed lessons can make a big difference to your child's education.

For unavoidable appointments, please email <u>admin@bristolfreeschool.org.uk</u> at least 48 hours in advance of the appointment, and include the time and date that you will collect your child, the time that you expect them to return to school, and evidence of the appointment (such as an appointment letter or text from the medical practice).

Please send your child to school before and after the appointment wherever possible. The legal registers are taken at 8.30am and 1.20pm, so being in school at these times will mean getting an attendance mark.

Students should make their way to Main Reception to sign out and will be sent to the carpark gate when their parent / carer buzzes for them. Students should be returned to the carpark gate after their appointment.

Armed with cameras, the students enthusiastically captured photographs of the sculptures and the stunning natural scenery. These photographs will undoubtedly serve as a valuable resource for their current coursework assignments, allowing them to incorporate real-world experiences into their studies.

As part of an engaging history project, students were given the opportunity to become researchers, exploring a topic of their choice related to the past. This week's Employer Talk was on Policing – what it is like to be a police officer and how to become one. We were joined by Sarah Williams and Christian Butler, both former police officers who now work at the University of the West of England teaching on the various UWE policing courses.

Students heard how working in the police is rewarding, fun and well-paid, though not particularly familyfriendly because of the demanding shift patterns. There are lots of opportunities within the police force to do a wide range of jobs. One of the benefits of joining is that your career can go in whichever direction you want it to, from working on response (responding to 999 calls) or becoming a mounted police officer, to training as a detective with the CID or working in armed response.

Sarah talked about some of the jobs she did while she was a serving police officer in Bristol, including emergency response, driving blue lights and riot control: she was the first officer to be assaulted – with an egg – during the Bristol police station riot in 2021. Christian told us how his role had been different from Sarah's as he worked in Gloucestershire and so had less of an inner-city role. He spent much of his time tackling drug-related crime, "jumping out of bushes on unsuspecting drug dealers".

Sarah and Christian gave students a lot of helpful information on how they can become a police officer by attending one of the UWE courses, which are taught in purpose-built accommodation with easy transport links. A three-year BSc Professional Policing Degree qualifies students to apply to any police force in the country for a police constable role. There is also the Degree Apprenticeship route, and the two-year Police Constable Entry Programme for those who do not want to do a full degree.

The facilities at UWE include a simulation suite, in which students can reenact the policing of real-life events, including murders, burglaries and domestic abuse. There is also a forensics house and police vehicles, ensuring students get a highly practical, hands-on education to prepare them for life as a police officer. As well as on-campus learning, many students at UWE choose to become volunteer Special Police Constables, who are not paid but have all the other powers of a regular police constable.
