Attendance and Attainment are Linked

New research by the Department for Education has shown that attendance strongly affects students' attainment. The DfE have said: "Year 11 pupils with near-perfect attendance are almost twice as likely to achieve grade 5 in English and Maths GCSE, compared to similar pupils attending 90-95% of the time. In other words, missing just 10 extra days a year reduces the likelihood of achieving these grades by around 50%."

As we reach the end of the school year, please check your child's attendance on the My Child At School app – remember that to be good, an attendance record needs to be 96% or above. If you are worried about your child's attendance, please contact the Attendance Office

STEM Day 2025 - Zombie Apocalypse!

On Monday, a zombie horde were spotted heading towards BFS and all of Year 7 and 8 were called upon to help us survive! After watching Mr East in full zombie prevention mode, addressing the school and explaining the gravity of the situation, students were tasked to use their best STEM skills to guard against disaster and save our school from the apocalypse. Everyone took part in a Science, Maths, DT and Ethics lesson, learning different skills along the way.

In Science, students learnt about the spread, and hopeful prevention, of disease, modelling the virus and engineering mini zombie defeating catapults to fend off our adversaries.

In Design Technology, students used engineering skills to create safe means of airdropping food and aid into the quarantine zone so that the population could carry on their battle.

Students used Maths to model and track the geographical spread of the virus across Bristol - hopefully meaning we could develop early warning systems to protect us.

There was also an ethical debate with students choosing which principles to employ in the human testing and vaccination efforts needed in a pandemic.

Finishing the day, we designed our own survival items and learnt how the 'real' zombie insects of the world live. Using these as inspiration, students created some very imaginative animal adaptations which could be the ultimate zombie bugs and creatures, hopefully not ones that we will run into in real life!





CAREERS DAY



On Monday 7 July, our Year 10 and Year 12 students took a significant step in exploring their future pathways during our annual Careers Day - a dynamic, hands-on event designed to provide real-world insight into post-16 options and the world of work.

Year 12 students also had a rich and purposeful day, starting with a keynote talk from Dale Willis of My Great First Job, who spoke about the power of networking and how platforms like LinkedIn can help young people source work experience, find paid work, and build a professional presence online. Dale stayed for the full day, delivering interactive workshops to support students in creating strong LinkedIn profiles and learning how to use the platform effectively.



Students also benefitted from a session on student finance and university funding led by Rosie Lunt from the University of the West of England, which gave them clear, up-to-date information on what to expect financially when applying to university.

We were also delighted to welcome back David McGregor, a former BFS student who shared his journey from Sixth Form to completing a Level 4 Apprenticeship in Software Engineering at Hargreaves Lansdown. His insights gave students a valuable real-world perspective on alternatives to university and the potential of the apprenticeship route.





Students were also able to choose from targeted workshops depending on their interests. Those considering apprenticeships or employment had the chance to attend a session on how to succeed at assessment centres, while others used the time to work on drafting and refining their UCAS personal statements, supported by staff. All students were also given the opportunity to join the employer talks happening as part of the Year 10 day - it was great to see so many taking up this fantastic opportunity.

The day was a fantastic success, and we extend a huge thank you to all of the guest speakers, volunteers, and staff who helped make it possible. Most of all, we are proud of our students, who approached the day with maturity, enthusiasm, and professionalism. Careers Day is just one part of our commitment to preparing students for life beyond school, and this year's event showed just how ready they are to take on the future.

THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD

Six Journeys, One Spirit: Reflections on Our Recent Duke of Edinburgh Expeditions

Over the past few months, we have had the privilege of guiding over 240 young people through six unforgettable Duke of Edinburgh's Award expeditions - two at each level: Bronze, Silver and Gold. From the gentle hills of our local countryside to the rugged beauty of the Brecon Beacons, each journey brought its own challenges, triumphs, and moments of growth.



Our expedition season began in April with the Bronze group, staying close to home. With 140 participants, it was our largest group and for many, their first time camping. The weather was on our side, offering perfect conditions for a gentle introduction to outdoor adventure.

May and June brought the Silver and Gold expeditions. The Silver practice took place in the scenic Wye Valley, while the qualifying expedition and Gold practice led us through the hills around Abergavenny. The Gold qualifying expedition culminated in the breathtaking landscapes of the Brecon Beacons.

Preparation and Perseverance

All participants took part in a skills training day in March, where they learned the essentials of navigation, campcraft, and teamwork. This foundation proved vital, especially as the later expeditions faced soaring temperatures. While the Bronze group enjoyed ideal weather, the Silver and Gold teams had to contend with heat-related challenges such as nosebleeds, fatigue, and the ever-present need to stay hydrated.

Despite the conditions, spirits remained high. H5, our expedition partner, provided expert support throughout, ensuring safety and structure while allowing the students to take ownership of their journeys.

Moments That Mattered

There were plenty of memorable moments: 100 students navigating the countryside at once, the occasional navigational hiccup during Silver practice, and the quiet pride of first-time campers setting up their tents with newfound confidence.

One of the most rewarding aspects was watching the transformation in our participants. From hesitant first steps to confident strides, each group grew in resilience, independence, and camaraderie. By the end of each expedition, every student crossed the finish line with a smile - tired, perhaps, but proud.



As a leader, it has been inspiring to witness the determination and positivity of these young people. My role across the expeditions varied, from supervising and supporting to assessing progress, but the constant was the joy of seeing growth in action.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is more than a hike or a campout, it is a journey of self-discovery, and I am grateful to have walked part of that path with these incredible young people.
