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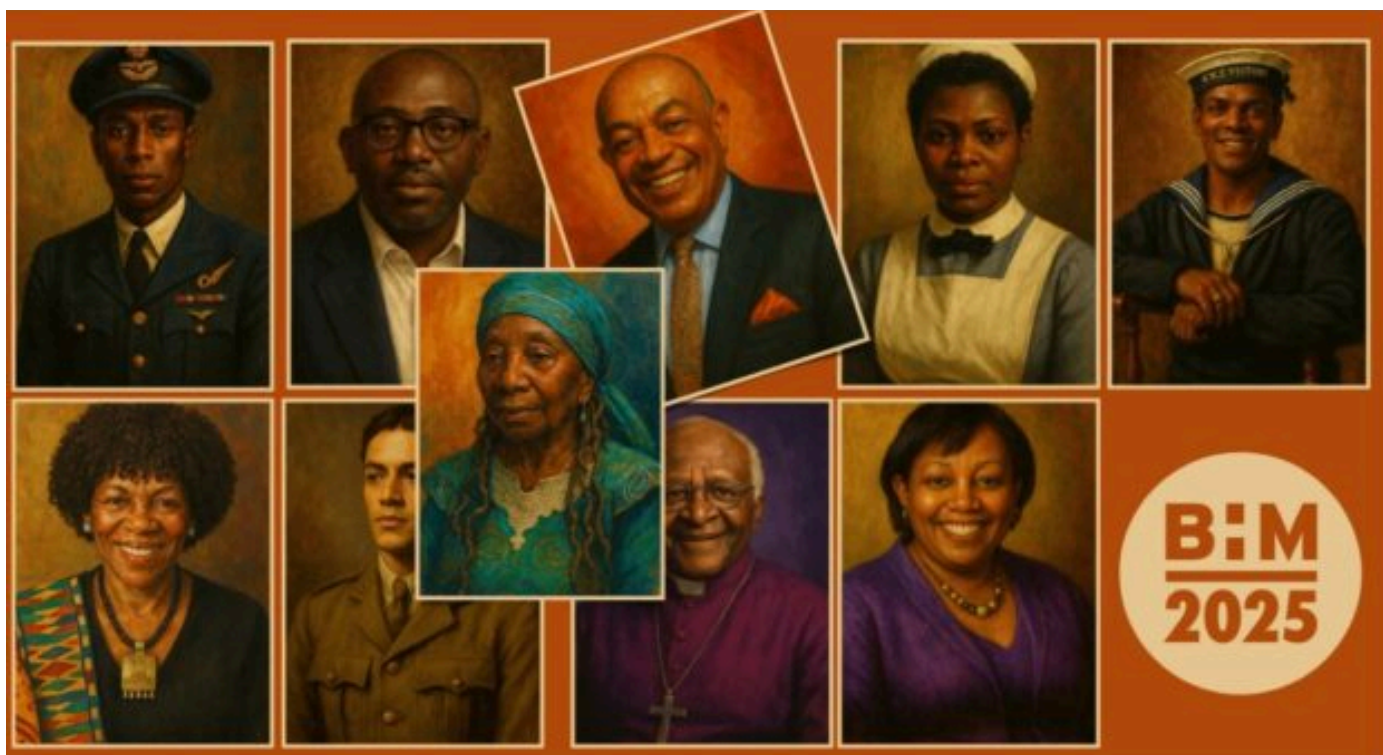
Every year schools in the UK celebrate Black History Month during October. The recognition for this event came originally from America following the dedication of Carter G Woodson who had devoted his life to promoting Black history within schools. This was adopted into the UK in 1987 following work by Ghanaian-born Akyaaaba Addai-Sebo who had seen the impact in America and wanted similar for the UK.

People from African and Caribbean backgrounds have been a fundamental part of British history for centuries, but campaigners argue that their contributions have often been overlooked and Black History Month seeks to raise awareness, whilst promoting and celebrating this contribution.

Each year Black History Month takes a different focus and this year the focus is ***Standing Firm in Power and Pride***, a powerful tribute to the resilience, strength, and unwavering commitment to progress that defines the Black community across the world. This year, the theme highlights the profound contributions made by Black people, whether they leaders, activists, or pioneers who have shaped history, while also looking towards a future of continued empowerment, unity, and growth.

One of the core priorities for the School is to fully embed our value of *mutual respect* with every student feeling that their voice and story can be heard within the community. Our focus during Black History Month is part of that but should not be a standalone event – instead Black history is being considered across all areas of the curriculum and school life on an ongoing basis. Students will be shown in assemblies how the School is doing this throughout the curriculum every year.



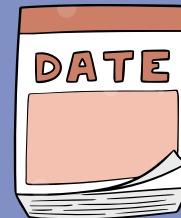

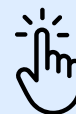

## Unauthorised Holidays

Please do not book term-time holidays. The Department for Education does not allow schools to authorise term-time holidays. Even one or two missed days can be highly disruptive to your child's education – remember that each day they will be missing out on 6 lessons of critical learning and vital information in tutor time. They will also be missing out on social times with their friends and all the extra clubs, trips and events in school.

Parents who take unauthorised holiday can expect to receive penalty notice fines from Bristol City Council. Currently the costs of penalty notices are:

- £80 per parent/carer per child for the first offence in a rolling three-year period, rising to £160 if not paid within 28 days.
- £160 per parent/carer per child for the second offence in a rolling three-year period.
- If a third offence occurs in a rolling three-year period, alternative action such as prosecution will result. Prosecution can result in fines of up to £2500 and / or 3 months imprisonment, as well as a criminal record.

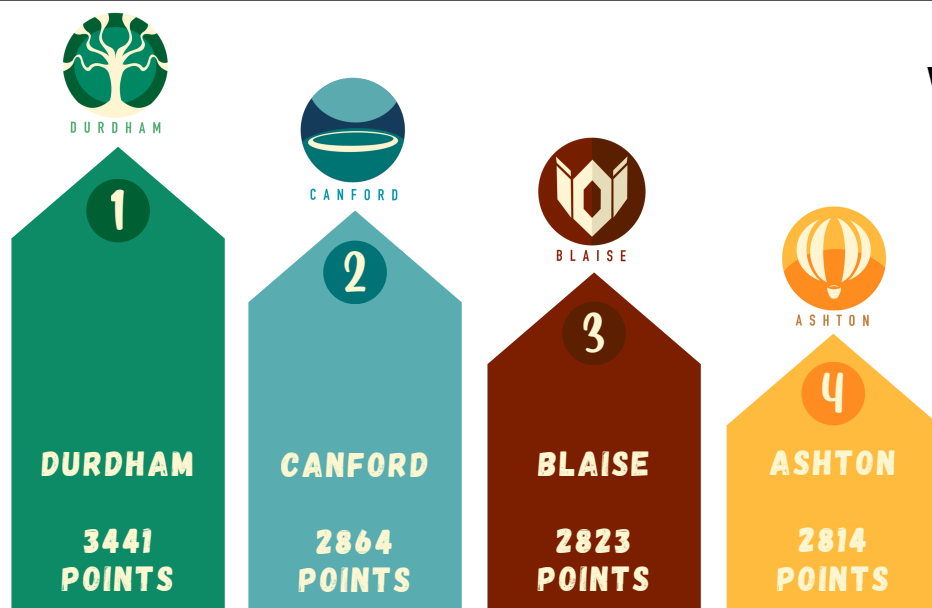

My name is Miss Coleman, and I am Head of Modern Foreign Languages (MFL). I have been here managing the department and teaching Spanish and French for 5 years. I started during COVID which meant I hardly met anyone in the first few months! I had been at my previous school for 13 years before coming to BFS, so it was quite a change, especially with no students in front of me at the start!

I studied Spanish and ICT at Exeter University after completing a Gap Year volunteering in Mexico. I originally had a place to do Law at Uni with a much higher-grade offer, but I gave up my place to pursue my love for Spanish and have never regretted it. I spent a year in Castellón, Spain as a Language Assistant as part of my degree and after completing my degree I left to go to Japan for a year on the JET programme. It was a wonderful experience and a year that helped me to learn a bit of Japanese and a lot about myself! Post Japan, I completed an MA at Bath University in Translation and Professional Language Skills but ended up working in retail management for a while before deciding to pursue a PGCE at UWE. I've never looked back, and I adore working with young people.

Outside of school, I spend a lot of days on the football field watching my children's sports teams and you'll regularly see me down at Ashton Gate supporting the mighty Reds. I love baking and used to make children's cakes as a sideline, from an entire Gruffalo story to a Cinderella castle. I also love walking my Beagle Betty, named after a song from my other favourite person: Taylor Swift!



MR NOUAS

My name is Mr Nouas, and I am Head of French. I have been Head of French for just over a year now, and teaching French and Spanish for over five years.

I studied French and Politics at Swansea University, achieving first class honours. I loved my time at university, spending days at the beach between going to lectures and studying at the library with friends. One requirement for studying a language at undergraduate-level is spending a year abroad to hone your language skills. This was something I really enjoyed! I spent a year in Poitiers, a town in France, as an English teaching assistant. During weekends I was fortunate enough to take the train to different cities in France to visit fellow course mates who were based in different cities such as Paris, Bordeaux, Toulouse, Lyon, and Marseille. This sparked my passion for teaching, so I then went on to study a PGCE at Bristol University after completing my undergraduate degree. I then got my first teaching job at BFS and have thoroughly enjoyed the profession, and I am consistently amazed at how great the students and staff are here!



Outside of school, I play five-a-side football with friends, we have even managed to win competitive leagues a couple of times! I have always been an avid supporter of Liverpool FC; my favourite players were Fernando Torres and Steven Gerrard back when I was younger. I also love travelling and trying new food from around the world. I really enjoy experiencing completely different cultures and my favourite place to visit in recent times was Japan a few years ago!

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My name is Mrs Robbins, and I have been teaching languages at BFS since 2019. I teach Spanish to every year group, and French lower down in the school also. I have had a variety of roles since starting at BFS in addition to teaching languages, including Head of Year 7 and Transition and EAL Co-ordinator.

### MRS ROBBINS

I moved to Bristol from Swansea, Wales almost fifteen years ago to study for my degree in Spanish and Italian at University of Bristol. I instantly fell in love with Bristol as a city and knew I wouldn't be returning to Wales anytime soon! My degree course was brilliant, and University of Bristol is such an amazing place to study languages. I had already studied Spanish through school, up to A Level and picked up Italian completely from scratch at university as an ab initio learner! From day one, the immersion to both languages was fantastic and I spent my entire third year abroad, refining and developing my linguistic skills further. I studied in both countries and was lucky enough to experience the cultures of two amazing cities; Salamanca (a city with one of the oldest universities in the world!) in Spain and Turin (the home of Fiat and Lavazza coffee!) in Italy. By the third year, my languages had reached more-or-less the same level, which is something I am very proud of.

After securing my undergraduate degree, I followed my life-long passion of working in education and I then qualified as a MFL teacher following completion of my PGCE at UWE. Ever since, I have worked with amazing students and staff, and I aspire to break the stigma of learning languages being 'difficult' as much as I possibly can. I love teaching at BFS, and it is a privilege to see students' confidence develop in my lessons.

In my free time, I love travelling and last year I had my first experience of the magic of Mexico, a country I have always been fascinated by! I also love visiting the gorgeous Gower Peninsula and spending time with my family there. Additionally, I am an avid crocheter and I love creating new pieces for myself and others. The more complex the pattern, the better, as I love a challenge!

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### DR CLAVEL

My name is Dr Clavel, and I have been teaching French and Spanish since 2019 at Bristol Free School. I come from the Southeast of France (with beautiful lavender fields) and my initial degrees are in English Studies and Philosophy. Later in life, I also studied for a PhD in Comparative Studies in English, American and French Literature at the University of Queen Mary, in London. The topic of my research was on the representation of children's punishment in nineteenth century literature. A fascinating topic (things have changed a lot!), which I loved.

While studying for my PhD I also worked as a language teaching assistant in secondary schools and realised that my vocation was teaching young people rather than the world of university. In the past, I have also worked as an editor on many educational textbooks, just like the ones that we use in our school. One of the things I love the most about teaching is to create lessons and resources for the classroom, which is something I developed when I was an editor.

Outside school, I love racket sports, hiking, doing yoga and pilates, and spending lots of time with my 5-year-old daughter who is the chattiest person in the world and keeps me very entertained!



**MRS ARDELEAN**

My name is Mrs Ardelean. I've been teaching Spanish and French at BFS since February 2023, and I've enjoyed every moment of it.

I was born in Transylvania, Romania (yes, the land of Dracula!), where I pursued a bilingual A Level in English and French. This passion for languages led me to complete a degree in French Linguistics. After graduating, I sought an international experience and moved to Santander, in northern Spain. What started as a temporary adventure turned into over 15 years of embracing Spanish culture, traditions, and lifestyle. I grew deeply attached to the city and its people - it truly became my second home.

While continuing my studies and exploring my career path in teaching, I worked as a flight attendant for Iberia Airlines. 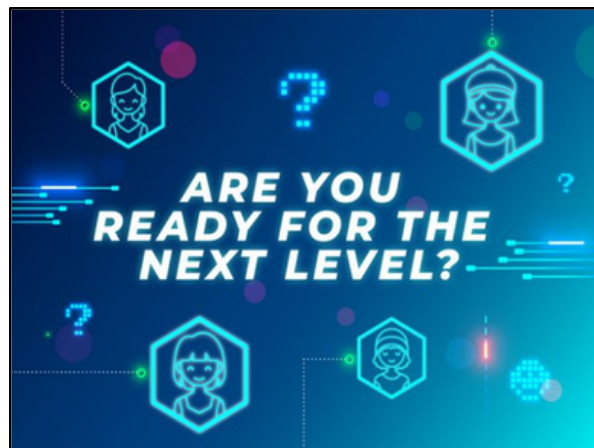
