

Christmas Lunch and Jumper Day - Wednesday 17 December

Please pre-order Christmas Lunch for your child if they would like to have a Christmas lunch on Wednesday 17 December. Please complete this on ParentPay as soon as possible for planning purposes only. Payment will be taken from your child's dinner account on the day, so please be sure they have sufficient funds in their account to cover the cost of the lunch which is £2.85. On the same day, we are inviting students to wear something Christmassy – either a Christmas jumper you already have or a Christmas hat, tinsel etc. but no face paints. Around 150,000 children in Bath & North East Somerset, Bristol, North Somerset, and South Gloucestershire aged from 5-15 years old can benefit from free bus travel again this winter (20 December to 4 January) – just by hopping on board, with no bus pass or registration required.

Kids Go Free is being funded using some of the £13.5 million Bus Grant funding secured from the Department for Transport by the West of England Mayoral Combined Authority.

Unauthorised Holidays - Miss School, Miss Out!

Please do not book term-time holidays. The Department for Education does not allow schools to authorise term-time holidays. Even one or two missed days can be highly disruptive to your child's education – remember that each day they will be missing out on 6 lessons of critical learning and vital information in tutor time. They will also be missing out on social times with their friends and all the extra clubs, trips and events in school.

RE

Parents who take unauthorised holidays can expect to receive penalty notice fines from Bristol City Council. Currently the costs of penalty notices are:

- £80 per parent/carer per child for the first offence in a rolling three-year period, rising to £160 if not paid within 28 days.
- £160 per parent/carer per child for the second offence in a rolling three-year period.
- If a third offence occurs in a rolling three-year period, alternative action such as prosecution will result.

Prosecution can result in fines of up to £2500 and / or 3 months imprisonment, as well as a criminal record.


Dear parents and carers,



MR GOWEN

Prior to teaching, I worked in hospitality and managed a pub in Hampshire, though a raucous ASDA Christmas party put me off the idea of pub management for a long-term career. I have a firstclass honours degree in English Literature that saw me specialise in graphic novels, the works of James Joyce, and Derridean deconstruction. I then completed my PGCE at the Institute of Education before working in various schools around London, including Highgate Wood where

I first met Miss Sayer.

Outside the classroom, I do my best to stay in shape through cycling, gym, yoga, and football – where I play with men in their twenties who are much fitter than me - but have to let me play because I'm the only one grown up enough to book the pitch! In the classroom, I teach Key Stage 3 and 4 English, helping students unlock their creativity and confidence in writing. Beyond lessons, I'm deeply involved with Year 11, making sure this milestone year is memorable - from prom and leavers' hoodies to GCSE success, results day celebrations, and the legendary End-of-Year video.

When I'm not planning exciting experiences for my students, you'll find me exploring scenic trails with my adorable 8-month-old Frenchie-Shar Pei cross, Reg. We're constantly stopped on walks because, honestly, he might just be the cutest puppy ever.

My name is Mr Treen, and I joined BFS in 2018. I studied English literature at the University of Exeter. After spending the majority of a year in North Africa, teaching conversational English, as a volunteer, I began to pursue a career in teaching. I completed my PGCE with the University of Bristol in 2017. Alongside teaching English to each Key Stage in the school, I am fortunate enough to be the school's Progression Coordinator - helping students with their applications to competitive entry courses at university.

Outside of school, I enjoy learning new skills and crafts, predominantly hedgelaying. I have competed in several competitions and came first in the Novice Pairs category of a regional competition last year. 




Stone Cold Study: In preparation for an upcoming essay, pupils have delved into the novel's context, researching themes such as homelessness and societal attitudes, whilst also developing a deeper understanding of the characters.









This term, Year 9 students have been immersing themselves in one of Shakespeare's most famous tragedies, Romeo and Juliet. They have not only enjoyed reading the play but have also explored its deeper themes and the complexities of its key characters. Through lively discussions and close analysis, students have considered the impact of fate, family, and conflict on the lives of the young lovers.



Alongside their study of the play, Year 9 have been refining their creative writing skills. A particular focus has been on using shifts in tone to create compelling narratives and evoke emotion in their readers. This has allowed students to experiment with style and voice, developing confidence in their own writing.

A personal highlight of the term for me was a fantastic debate led by my wonderful class, which gave students the opportunity to practise their speaking and listening skills in a dynamic and engaging way.

Looking ahead to next term, we are really excited to begin studying The Boxer, a powerful and thought-provoking novel. Students will continue to develop their understanding of voice and perspective in writing, exploring how authors craft authentic characters and narratives. It promises to be another term full of creativity and challenge!







Currently Year 10 are exploring "The Scottish Play" (Macbeth by William Shakespeare). Recently they were treated to – and performed in – a raucous staging by Sky Blue Theatre.

This dark tragedy is as relevant as it ever was, against an international backdrop of fear and discontent, despotic rulers and political machinations. More pertinently we can ask ourselves how far we should go to fulfil our own ambitions, who we can truly trust and whether the righteous can truly flourish in our sometimes unpredictable world?

Alongside this, we recently have been flexing our creative muscles with an eye on GCSE English Language. Here's a selection of short excerpts that I think really showcase some of the talented writers we have coming through the ranks:

"The blanket of night covered the sky, making not even the stars visible to the naked eye."

"Growing up I was very nosy, I wanted to know everything."

"His bedroom floor was a disgrace. Old clothes littered it, like a graveyard filled with lost souls."

"The streets appear lifeless; this part of Brooklyn never sees action."







This term, Year 11 have truly shone. Their dedication to mastering language skills has been inspiring, and they are well on their way to becoming confident, articulate writers. Alongside this, students have delved into the world of Victorian literature, exploring either Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde or A Christmas Carol. Through detailed analysis of characters, plot, and the writer's intentions, they have demonstrated impressive insight and critical thinking.

Their ability to evaluate literary methods and apply them to extracts and essays has been outstanding. Class discussions have been vibrant and thoughtful, showcasing excellent oracy skills. Most recently, Year 11 approached their mock exams with resilience and determination, revising for all three English papers with admirable self-motivation. Next up: DIRT lessons, where students will respond to feedback and refine their written work to an even higher standard.



Year 12 have been delving deeply into Mary Shelley's Frankenstein, exploring how the novel operates on multiple levels. They have been learning new concepts such as framing narratives, the layered structure of Walton's letters and Victor's account, and how shifting settings - from the icy Arctic to the Swiss Alps - shape mood and meaning. Alongside this, they have examined the Gothic tradition, considering how Shelley uses darkness, isolation, and the sublime to heighten tension.



MR GOWEN

The class has also blended literary analysis with historical context, connecting the text to Greek myth through the Promethean allegory, and situating it within the intellectual currents of Romanticism and the Enlightenment. Their discussions have been lively and insightful, especially when tackling themes of male privilege, queer theory, and society's harsh judgments based on appearances.

Next, they will compare Shelley's nineteenth-century vision with Kazuo Ishiguro's more contemporary Never Let Me Go, exploring how both texts interrogate creation, identity, and ethical responsibility across different eras.



Our Year 13 students have been working incredibly hard this term as they prepare for their mock exams. They are also adding the finishing touches to their comparative NEA piece, exploring Pink Mist, alongside their chosen partner text.

Once mocks are complete, we will dive into Rossetti's poetry - the final taught component of the A Level course. Looking ahead to the new year, students will have the exciting opportunity to attend a lecture by Professor Green, an expert on the prose texts we study.


The Help by Kathryn Stockett Review by Mia, Year 8

1962, Jackson Mississippi. A world where white women play bridge while black maids raise their children. Stockett transports us to a place and time where racial segregation is at its worst.

Aibileen has spent her whole life raising white babies, treating them as her own, but isn't allowed to share the bathroom. After the tragic loss of her own son, Aibileen is still forced to go to work and look after her 'second child', Mae Mobley, whose mother is too busy playing bridge to appreciate her own daughter.

Then there's Minnie. A sass-mouthed black maid, famous for her cooking but also for being fired by ringleader Hilly Holbrook for reasons too terrible to talk about. Her new boss is the only woman in Jackson who doesn't know of her reputation.

Last, but not least, there's Miss 'Skeeter' Phelan – a tall, young white woman, graduate of Ole Miss and employee of the local newspaper. She longs to become a writer, but Mama won't let anything get in the way of marrying her daughter off, regardless of her ambitions.



An unlikely friendship ignites between our three protagonists, and their bravery and tenacity change the future of Jackson forever.

I couldn't put this book down and loved learning about this vital chapter in history through such vivid and engaging characters. It was hilarious and heartbreaking, and I would thoroughly recommend it for Year 8s and above.
