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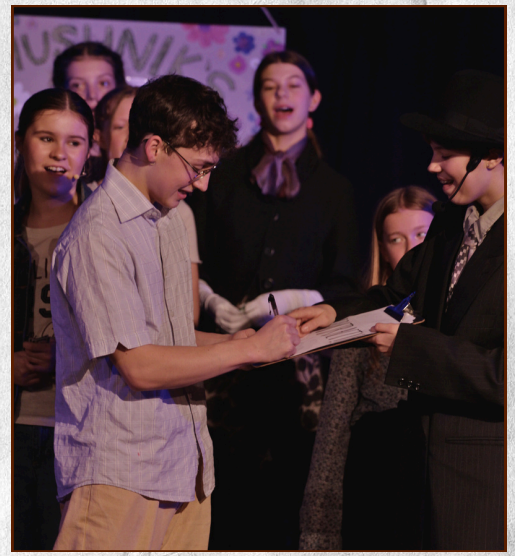
## LITTLE SHOP OF HORRORS

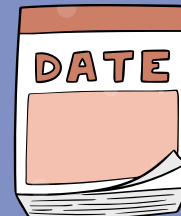

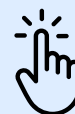

## PENALTY NOTICES AND PROSECUTION

At BFS, we work with Bristol City Council to fine parents/carers of students with unauthorised absences.

Unauthorised absences are issued for:

- Arrival after the register closes at 9am without good reason
- Unauthorised holidays and other events not authorised by the Head Teacher
- Absences where no reason has been supplied by the parent / carer
- Absences where medical evidence has been requested by the school and not received.

Penalty notice fines are normally for ten unauthorised sessions (each day being two sessions) of absence in a ten-week period. Penalty notices can also be issued to parents who repeatedly take absence below this threshold. Prosecutions can also be issued if more appropriate than a penalty fine.

Currently the costs of penalty notices are:

- £80 per parent/carers per child for the first offence in a rolling three-year period, rising to £160 if not paid within 28 days.
- £160 per parent/carers per child for the second offence in a rolling three-year period.
- If a third offence occurs in a rolling three-year period, alternative action such as prosecution will result.

Prosecution can result in fines of up to £2,500 and/or 3 months imprisonment, as well as a criminal record.

At BFS we prefer to take a supportive approach to attendance before taking these legal measures, so please contact the attendance office if you are concerned by your child's attendance.

# Psychology



### YEAR 12 & 13



Year 12 psychologists are currently finishing up their latest topic on memory - looking at the unreliable nature of eyewitness testimony and how it is impacted by factors such as misleading information and anxiety. They are now starting a unit on attachment and have become proud parents! Pictured are Ruby and Eden's babies Pat and Pat, non-identical twins. They are working to establish proximity to their baby and make sure they keep them safe.

Year 13 psychologists have been learning about schizophrenia, in particular the classification and diagnosis process as well as how it can be explained and treated from a biological level, looking at the role of neurotransmitters, such as dopamine, and antipsychotic drugs. They are currently working very hard in the lead-up to their second round of mocks after half-term; both Ms Norton and I are very proud of them and feel confident that they will smash it. ## Young Orator of the Year



### YEAR 12

Gresham College runs an annual oracy competition for state school students in Year 12 to promote the art of communicating complex information in a clear, concise and compelling way. Students are asked to submit a five-minute, recorded presentation on a given topic.

Students should choose ONE of the following questions to answer\*, making a reasoned argument:

- Do protests do more harm than good in today's society?
- Is tradition something that we should preserve or challenge?
- Does cancel culture help society progress, or silence free speech?
- Should AI ever be allowed to make life-changing decisions? (For example - in Medicine, Law or Policing?)
- Many theatre critics describe theatrical productions as 'vital'... Are they?
- Are global tourism and sustainability fundamentally incompatible?

Students should submit a recorded video presentation of no more than 5 minutes – the main focus should be the student speaking, but they can use images, graphs, slides, or other visual props that help explain their points. Shortlisted candidates will then be invited to present again in person in London, and there will be three awards (including prizes for the student and their school). Students will need to fill out a form with their entry details and then upload their video file. Please note that the file uploaded **MUST** have the student's first name and surname in the title. 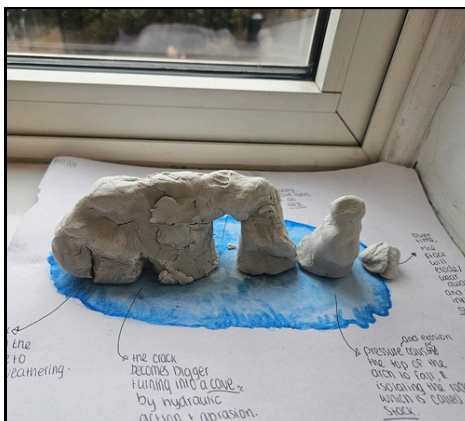


# GEOGRAPHY
