Maths Inspiration 2016

A group of 50 Year 11 and 12 students were treated to a feast of mathematical delights when they travelled to Cardiff for the Maths Inspiration Show.

The speakers this year were the popular author of Maths books Rob Eastaway, Dr Jen Rogers, a statistician from Oxford University and Dr Hugh Hunt of Cambridge University who has worked with motorcycle racer Guy Martin on the Channel 4 series "Speed". As an extra festive treat the presentations included the mathematics of sport, with special guest former Welsh Rugby Captain Ryan Jones.

The session began by looking at the maths of decision making, including popular fairground games, and proposed a statistical analysis of Chris Robshaw's decision whether to go for a penalty kick or a line out at a now infamous rugby match.

Continuing the rugby theme, the forward pass rule was analysed using vectors, and the optimum position to take a conversion kick located using circle theorem, with Ryan Jones adding his

perspective to how the theory has to be adapted during matches. Students saw demonstrations of the effect of spin on cycle wheels, balls and gyroscopes which was then linked to Frank Lampard's disallowed goal in the 2010 world cup.

One of our students, Chandler won a mathematical competition, bringing back a rugby ball signed by Ryan Jones. It was a truly inspirational event, illustrating the applications of maths to a wide range of real life situations. *Mrs Conway*

Mental Health First Aid

Pastoral staff at BFS have recently received Mental Health First Aid training for schools and colleges. This informative and high quality training was in response to the growing evidence of poor mental health among young people. Along these lines, one of our own parents is currently involved in 'The Body Image Movement' and is hosting a screening of a powerful documentary film called 'Embrace' in The Odeon cinema in Bristol on 18 January 2017. The film documents a woman and her personal journey towards the acceptance of her body and her realisation that striving for an unattainable ideal is not a useful pursuit.
