Words from the Headteacher

I sometimes feel as though I should preface every newsletter with the simple announcement; "It's been a busy week". It is a challenge to keep up with the array of things happening at any given time in and around the school. We've had visitors in across the week, including Radio Bristol catching up with our Young Carers and Vernon Samuels, an Olympic Triple Jumper, coming in from the Sky Sports Academy to meet with our Sports Leaders, taking sessions and exploring ideas of motivation and achievement. He demonstrated to an enthralled group of students just how far an Olympic triple jump is, as well as an 8 metre long jump. They found it hard to comprehend that anyone could soar that far through the air. It was an impressive demonstration of the heights (and lengths) of human achievement.

This time last year I used a particular phrase, after Alex Ferguson, referencing the sound made by a football spectator's bottom moving around in a plastic seat while squirming under pressure. It caused some mirth, but also some consternation, so I won't use the phrase again. Maybe 'Fergie time' is a better indication of where we are. In short, it's never too late to score an injury time winner, to claw back a goal or to change the complexion of a match. This theory of time applies to our Year 11s. Having watched the film 'Arrival' recently it made me think that sometimes teachers invariably know the outcome of, for example, inactivity or refusal to complete a particular practice paper. They can see that it leads inexorably to a point in the distance where the outcome is realised. However, that future outcome also exists in the present; the result is crystallised at the moment of refusal or opt-out. The crushing certainty of the outcome of a bad choice is one of the frustrations of being a teacher and working with young people. Nevertheless, there are opportunities to change the outcome right up until the final few moments prior to the exam. At 15 weeks to go (including holidays), there are 110 days left to prepare. If ever time needed to be well spent, it is now. Every opportunity to improve that is spurned is accompanied by the sound of a door closing which can no longer be opened. It is the narrowing of opportunity, the tapering of a future that should be expansive.

On the topic of time and space, several hardy existential voyagers made the journey to King's College, Taunton, for their annual Philosophon, accompanied by Miss Melville and Mrs Anderton. It's fantastic to see young people engaging with abstract thought and attempting to deconstruct the nature of the lived world, where nothing is real apart from the reality of our own thoughts and existence. The only downside I can think of is the challenging questions I get hit with on their return. On visiting a drama lesson I found myself embroiled in a conversation about whether drama tasks are any more or less real than physics controlled assessments, and whether in reality nothing really matters because we're all just elements of Harry or Max's imagination. Something to ponder perhaps.
