#### Words from the Headteacher

We were fortunate to welcome in two remarkable people this week. On Wednesday the school held a Duke of Edinburgh's Award presentation evening organised by Dr Cooper. It is just one element of Dr Cooper's tireless efforts to develop the scheme in school. Former bomb-aimer George 'Johnny' Johnson was our guest of honour. Mr Johnson won the Distinguished Flying Medal for his role in Operation Chastise (the Dambusters raid) and the raid on the Sorpe Dam as a member of 617 Squadron under Guy Gibson. He told tales of bombing runs at 30 feet, flying beneath church steeples and under electricity cables, but also recounted the sombre details and the human cost for the aircrew involved; 53 of the 133 who took part in the raid were killed.



On Thursday Zigi Shipper came in to BFS. He was born in Łódź in 1930 to a Jewish family. During the war Zigi was imprisoned at Auschwitz and then at Stutthof concentration camp. Zigi shared his testimony as a survivor of the Holocaust with our Year 9 students. It is the second year he has visited, and as with Johnny Johnson's visit, we felt honoured and privileged to hear first-hand of experiences which normally reside within the pages of



textbooks. The profound effect of living memory on all who listened cannot be underestimated. An atmosphere of contemplation permeated the room, accompanied by complex feelings of what it means to survive and to overcome the most extraordinary of challenges and traumatic experiences.

Whilst we fixate on the famous and read ephemeral biographies of people in their early 20s who spring to success through the fickle world of the TV talent show, it strikes me quite forcibly that true heroism and genuine achievements lie in the endless capacity of ordinary people to do extraordinary things. True heroism lies in the testimonies of Zigi Shipper and Johnny Johnson. They represent the accomplishments and stories of everyone who lived through the Second World War.

Our students and young people here have begun to do extraordinary things; to test themselves and to face up to challenges. The Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme is just one example. My hope is that they never have to face the same challenges that Zigi and Johnny have encountered; but that they approach life with the same degree of humility, resilience, humanity and courage.

Fiona Gibbs in Year 10 has won a place in the national final of the African Adventures School Geography Challenge. To win her place Fiona completed a decision making exercise, focusing on how best to help an Kenyan village after a flooding event. Fiona's work was commended by the judges for being "well written with brilliant development of points". Fiona will compete with nine other finalists at the end of March and the Geography Department are keeping their fingers crossed for her, as first prize is a week long trip to Kenya for four students and two teachers. #### Paper 1: NON-CALCULATOR EXAM

Year 11 Y-Side: Monday 20 February Period 1 and 2 Year 11 X-Side: Tuesday 21 February Period 1 and 2

#### Paper 2: CALCULATOR EXAM

All year 11s: Wednesday 22 February Period 3 and 4

#### Paper 3: CALCULATOR EXAM

All year 11s: Wednesday 22 February Period 5 and 6

Students should be continuing to complete their MathsWatch assignment homework and doing any additional revision homework that their teachers have set.

Students should remember to bring all the necessary equipment, i.e. a CALCULATOR, protractor, pair of compasses, ruler, pencil, rubber and pen.

I look forward to seeing the school become a fantastical world full of literary heroes and heroines! Miss McGrath






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#### Art Exhibition

#### **Children's Mental Health Week 2017**

Bristol Free School prides itself on its wellbeing focus and has developed a number of systems, projects and interventions to try and tackle mental health issues. Feedback from our Wellbeing Survey will follow in future newsletters. The Wellbeing Ambassador Scheme has been set up as part of this focus and aims to promote wellbeing from within the student body. Wellbeing Ambassadors are recruited to support primary transition, act as peer mentors and champion wellbeing in the school. They have received training on wellbeing and are developing ideas to embed mentally healthy behaviours and attitudes in our school community.

The Wellbeing Ambassadors have been promoting children's mental health weeks' 2017 theme by spreading kindness around the school. Being kind to others has a number of benefits in a school; it can make someone else feel positive, it can make us feel more positive about ourselves and it can work to improve the "feeling" of the school. To promote this idea of kindness, the Ambassadors have been out every day this week decorating outside areas with "kindness graffiti". This is in

addition to running tutorial sessions with our year 7 students to talk about the importance of kindness.

#### **JHJK Productions**


