Words from the Headteacher

Our students are a mature and thoughtful group. They have humane values and a love of learning. In these challenging times, where acts of callous cruelty and violence seem all too commonplace, humane values are more important than ever. I am constantly reassured by the reaction of our students to events in the wider world and around the country; they are measured, dignified and above all else, tolerant. This is a multi-cultural and diverse school and we celebrate unashamedly the plurality of our community. We are united by our love of learning and our desire to make the world a better place; no-one is better placed to achieve this; teachers work with young people and young people work with teachers. Together we create hope and optimism, yes, through celebrating diversity, but also through challenging those values which have no place in school, at home or in society as a whole.

We have reasserted our core values as a community this week and as a staffing body have been reflecting on these during our INSET session: consideration, responsibility, resilience, commitment and aspiration. These are abstract ideas, but when they guide and influence our behaviour, and our responses to others, they become concrete. Our values and ethos resonate with those at home and in society as a whole and we reinforce them in our teaching and our language. Young people represent our future, and putting their needs first, above the self-interest of adulthood, of work and stress that leads us, as adults, to make strange choices, can only result in a better world for everyone.

On a prosaic but linked note, we have started our primary transition visits this week. Miss Nowak has been spending time in our cluster primary schools meeting each student. It's a process that every student goes through; preparing for the move to secondary school. In fact, it's something we all went through, even if it was a very long time ago. It can be fraught with anxiety but as we have established over the past five years, our support and approach is highly successful. We are looking forward to welcoming in our new Year 7 for the induction day in July, before things kick off in earnest in September.

There are a couple of cosmetic changes for term 6. Students are no longer expected to wear blazers; it is 'summer dress'. It is a simple way of coping with the hot weather, although this week has been decidedly autumnal in tone. This week we have been trialling our single lunch sitting. It has been a resounding success. It is simpler for staff and simpler for students. It is also a great thing to have all students out on break at the same time. The catering team have coped well and the queues have been minimal, even on 'Chips Friday'. We will tweak and adapt for September and move onwards.

Lastly, our Year 11 are now on study leave. They are working their way through their GCSE exams; coming in for revision sessions and doing their best to ensure that they succeed. They have the full and unrelenting support of their fantastic teachers.


Please bring your trainers and water/a drink to each session and come dance to latest chart hits plus learn some "Old Skool" anthems!
