Words from the Headteacher

Summer definitely has arrived this week, in the form of a fairly challenging heatwave. Students have been staying as cool as possible, which has not been easy. I am glad for the return of slightly cooler temperatures, even if it does mean we have to put our ties back on.

We have been expanding our work with our primary feeder schools this year in a range of different areas. Mrs Sherman has taken an army of Digital Leaders out to Westbury-on Trym recently. They provide workshops on e-safety and computing to Year 6 and below. It has been a very successful programme, and this week 3 of them visited London at the invitation of the NSPCC, to present to their annual conference, a privilege indeed.

Alongside our IT efforts, a number of students have been working with Stoke Bishop school as language ambassadors, delivering four activities in Spanish to Year 6 students. The feedback from the primary students was super; "please make sure you do it again next year!" As if that isn't enough, we've also been working to develop Latin and Classics provision in Henleaze and other schools, with Ms Walsh leading the charge and supporting them with the development of minimus.

Outside of the classroom, our sports leaders are an increasingly common sight at primary school events, including their sports days and fixtures. They help organise and make sure students are able to compete and get engaged. It is great to see the level of involvement across the board as the links between our local primaries and BFS become established and we look forward to continuing new areas of collaboration next year.

Students worked hard preparing advice and guidance for parents of Year 6 who will be joining us in September as well as including top tips for the students themselves. The Headteacher was impressed with their confident delivery and excellent suggestions.

On Wednesday, Fiona Gibbs, Trinity Foord and Katie Taylor had an early start from Bristol Parkway to get to Queen Elizabeth II



Conference Centre in Westminster. As soon as we walked out of Westminster Tube Station we were greeted by the sight of Big Ben, the Houses of Parliament and what seemed like hundreds of police officers as our visit coincided with the Queen's Speech and the opening of Parliament. We registered at the conference and were quickly whisked away to our own Green Room, where the girls were miked up and shown the stage - then the nerves really hit!

All three have written blog entries for Childnet which will go on their website next week and here are some extracts from them. Fiona explains how she felt "The few slots before ours that we saw included a very interesting talk about Apps For Good, which involved students around our age creating their own apps. We also heard an inspirational talk via Skype from Trisha Prabu, an American teenager that has taken an incredible role in preventing cyberbullying. Then it was our turn. I was really nervous, but our speech was very well received. Some of the questions they asked at the end were rather confusing, as people tended to talk for a while before asking their question, and then we didn't know exactly what they were asking... That was tricky! During the break, several people approached us and said that we had been rather impressive — that more than made up for any nerves we might have had at the start!" Trinity adds "We even managed to encourage a Headteacher from a school, to email his IT teacher, and get them to sign up for the Digital Leaders programme. How cool is that? Lots of people came up to us and congratulated us."

I am so proud of all of the Digital Leaders, who have worked incredibly hard since we formed in January and are looking forward to delivering the next workshop at St Ursula's in July. Look out for our Online Safety Parent sessions coming your way in the autumn!
