
Tickets are available to buy for £5/£3 concessions from Student Services, with proceeds being used to cover some of the production costs.

On Wednesday night, we had the proud pleasure of accompanying 111 students from Years 10 & 11 to see the National Theatre's touring production of 'Macbeth' at the Wales Millennium Centre in Cardiff. This was an opportunity for students to experience their GCSE Shakespeare text brought to life from the comfort of their very own stalls seats. It was a terrific night; the students' behaviour was exemplary and 'civilians' who found themselves surrounded by BFS uniforms might have resigned themselves to distraction and disruption at the start of the night, but actually ended up passing on their compliments to staff, saying our students were 'a credit to the school'.

Students commented on how the dystopian approach to the text gave them another angle on and deeper understanding of the meaning of the play; that the facial expressions of the actors – clearly visible from our super stalls seats - helped reveal the emotions behind the actions and how the use of music and sound effects added to the spectacle. It was a late night and we had lots of tired staff and students on Thursday, but all very worthwhile.
