When it was announced the final of the Woodcock Shield was to be at Ashton Gate Stadium, students were in disbelief. Usually, the final is played at a school pitch. Once it had sunk in that some school games were going to lead to the home of the Robins and Bears, the players became exceptionally excited. For me, it never felt more like being a professional coach than having to use the expression 'one game at a time'.

On the mini-bus prior to the quarter final Karim said, "I don't even care if we lose the final, I just want to play at Ashton Gate". It has been a dream for all of our young footballers to play at the same ground that Manchester United played on last season and that the Spice Girls chose for their comeback tour this summer.

Overcoming adversity

As the current Champions of Bristol we were afforded a bye in the first round.

In the second round, BFS settled an old score with Chipping Sodbury School (CSS). CSS knocked us out of the first round of the FA schools' cup in September, however this time we beat them emphatically 6-2.

The quarter-final was far tougher: 0-0 against Abbeywood at the SGS Wise campus led to a period of extra time. The home team took the lead, but with 10 minutes left on the clock, Xavier found an equaliser and Kyle produced a winner to send us off to Mangotsfield for the semi-final.

The semi-final did not start well, and we went 1-0 down with less than a minute played. However, this only inspired the captain, Bailey, (who has captained the team since Year 7) and Kyle to change our fortunes. Kyle scored an impressive hat trick, deservedly earning him the man of the match award, and Buster contributed with a goal and an assist, helping us to win 5-2. Every player played as a

champion. As individuals they are all very good players, but together they are a colossal team.

The final

The changing-room facilities were jaw-dropping. Ashton Gate's recent redevelopment has made it a Premier League standard venue and a supporter's experience of a lifetime. Changing in the Home changing room, walking through the tunnel as we heard, "please welcome to the pitch Bristol Free School" and the roar from the 400 strong crowd, was an unforgettable experience. For anyone who has ever dreamed of being a footballer, this was special.





Ultimately we did not have the fairy-tale ending but would St Bede's have traded places with us? Absolutely! This was a dream – and we lived it! The game itself started with Hanham looking very strong; they dominated the opening 10 minutes and we were actually grateful to only be 1-0 down at half time.

In the second half the tables were turned; we dominated the first 15 minutes and almost scored with Theo and Buster both trying their luck from a distance. Kyle came closest to finding the equaliser with a glancing header that looked goal bound, but went inches wide. Hanham came back into the contest and were worthy 2-0 winners. After the game opposition players were congratulated. BFS don't go down without a fight, but this was an opportunity to say 'fair play' to the winners and demonstrate a good sporting attitude. Playing in the final was the prize, and this sporting highlight will remain for some of these young men throughout their lives: 'I played there once'; 'I've walked in my hero's footsteps'.

Team BFS will be back next year, of course, ready to challenge as champions of Bristol. Bailey and Karim have recently been selected to represent the Bristol/South Glos district, Harvey is developing in the Bristol Rovers Academy and Jojo has been training with the first team at Forest Green Rovers this week.

The student corner is a piece by one of our students sharing something relevant to them, in or out of school. This week, Aleesha Rashid in Year 10 writes about Ramadan.

Ramadan is the ninth month in the Islamic calendar. During this month Muslims fast for 30 days, meaning they can only drink and eat before sunrise and after sunset. This year Ramadan started on the 6th May, but every year it slightly changes due to the lunar calendar (which moves forward around 10 days each year). Muslims fast to bring them closer to their god, Allah, by cleansing their soul through prayers and reflecting on how fortunate they are. There are exceptions for some people e.g if they're elderly, ill or pregnant; they can donate money to feed the less fortunate people instead of fasting. At the end of Ramadan there is a celebration called Eid where Muslims gather together at the Mosque to pray before having a big celebration with their families.

I am looking forward to Eid and the celebration with my family.

HE+ Programme

For the second year running a group of our Year 12 students have taken part in the HE+ programme run by Cambridge University. The programme is aimed at supporting students to make competitive applications to the top universities in the country. Our students took part in conferences and attended seminars with top academics to help them make informed decisions about which subject they will apply to study at university. They were also asked to conduct a research project and produce an academic poster on a topic of their choice.

On Wednesday 9 May students gathered for the HE+ finale event where their research posters were displayed and judged. Two of our students' posters were shortlisted for best in their subject strand; these were Pippa Stephenson for Physical Sciences and Sophie Gordon for Liberal Arts.
