#### ATTENDANCE MATTERS

Penalty Notices and Prosecution
Penalty notices can be issued to parents
and carers if they fail to ensure the regular
attendance of their child at school. Most
commonly they are issued for unauthorised
holidays, but they can also be issued for
irregular attendance at school. Penalty
notice fines are currently £60 per student
per parent. So, if two parents take a
student on an unauthorised holiday, both
parents may receive a £60 fine.

Failure to pay a penalty notice may result in a prosecution from the local authority. In cases of poor attendance at school, the local authority may deem prosecution to be a more appropriate measure than a penalty notice. A prosecution can lead to fines of up to £2500 or imprisonment.

Penalty notices and prosecutions are mentioned on attendance letters that we send home to the parents and carers of students with concerning attendance records. This is because the local authority consider it to be best practice to inform parents of the consequences of poor attendance from the earliest point that a concern is raised.

As a school, we prefer to work with parents to solve attendance issues at an early stage and only use prosecution as a final resort.

Firstly I would like the opportunity to welcome you back from what I hope was a restful and relaxing half term, and to get prepared for an action packed Term 2. I have had the pleasure of delivering assemblies this week and I really wanted to focus on the positives of Term 1. We have awarded an incredible 24000 house points in Term 1 alone with some students already pushing upwards of 70 house points. A truly remarkable amount and we have easily surpassed the total compared to this time last academic year.

I also wanted to take this opportunity to send a reminder about some of our expectations and standards within school. We expect all students to be on-site by 8.25am so that they can be in their tutor room by 8.30am. Students must adhere to our uniform code. We are seeing an increase in piercings and I must reiterate that we allow one piercing per ear lobe only, that is a gold or silver stud. We do not allow nose-piercings.

You may have noticed that we are now running a '1 minute detention'. This may not sound as though it is much of a sanction, but its purpose is for the teacher to have a quick re-set of any low-level classroom expectations that have not been met. We have found it to be very useful and having a face to face re-set after a lesson that has not gone well, is proving to be very powerful in making sure the next lesson goes smoothly. For more severe misdemeanours, students will still receive a same-day after school detention.



# YEAR 13 HISTORY, POLITICS AND SOCIOLOGY STUDENTS HEAD TO LONDON!


In the week before half term, our Year 13 History, Politics and Sociology students enjoyed a fantastic trip to London to support their A Level studies. All students began their day with a tour of Westminster and the Houses of Parliament. This turned out to be a day of highly significant political events; the final Prime Minister's Questions for the outgoing and under-fire Liz Truss, and the day of Suella Braverman's resignation as Home Secretary! Students were given an insight into the workings of the House of Commons and the House of Lords, and their roles in British parliamentary democracy. Some students were also able to watch the Speaker's procession and spotted some wellknown MPs including Penny Mordaunt.

Students then embarked on a Thames
Clipper journey from Westminster to the
Tower of London, taking in London's sights
from the River Thames before separating into
two groups. Our History students went on a
bespoke tour of the Tower of London, with a
specific focus on the period of the Wars of
the Roses. They studied the Tower of London
as a source of historical evidence,
investigating long-standing historical
mysteries such as the disappearance of the
Princes in the Tower under Richard III and
the death of Henry VI. They even got to see
the Crown Jewels!





Meanwhile, Sociology and Politics students went to visit the Old Bailey where students sat in the public gallery to view two court cases in progress. Both trials were for very serious crimes; students behaved impeccably and showed great respect for the court process, learning lots about the role of the jury and the interactions that happen between lawyers, witnesses and the judge.
