## YOUTH SPEAKS ORACY COMPETITION

The English Department were delighted to have two teams from Bristol Free School enter the Rotary Club's annual 'Youth Speaks' competition, held at Redmaids' High School.

First up was our intermediate team, with the motion: This House would ban vaping in the UK'. Alba was an excellent chairperson, maintaining a sense of decorum throughout. Proposing the motion, Miranda made impressive use of research and alarming case studies to convince the judges that vaping is at least as dangerous as smoking to our personal, public and environmental health. For the opposition, Lucy's speech was full of perceptive rebuttal, and raised the question of whether banning vaping would indeed address the root problem of nicotine addiction.

We then moved on to our senior team, ably chaired by Simon, who had chosen the motion 'Does cancel culture inhibit art?', Lily gave an impassioned speech proposing the motion, questioning whether cancel culture – should it have been conceived in the 1970s – would have prevented the creation of iconic films such as The Rocky Horror Picture Show. This was then countered by Nushanti, who argued cancel culture is merely the next step forward in holding others to account for potentially offensive or damaging opinions.

Both teams really impressed the judges with their confidence and preparedness and the event's organiser remarked that they showed 'assurance beyond their years'. We are extremely proud of them!

#### **EMPLOYER TALKS**

This morning we welcomed Gill Holt who is one of the first team physiotherapists working for Bristol City Football Club; Gill is now in her 25th season with the club. We had a full room of Year 9 - Year 13 students excited to learn more about the role of physiotherapists in professional sport.

Gill talked about her day-to-day role working on the rehabilitation of players as well as injury prevention and her role on match days where she communicates with the management team to decide whether player should be brough off the pitch.

She also talked about a range of other professionals that she works with at the club and the role that they have including, strength and conditioning coaches, sports therapists, nutritionists, and psychologists. She gave students an insight into the commitment required to work in professional sport, the responsibility that comes with such a role as well as how students can get into working in professional sport.

Gill also gave an insight into her early career in the NHS and working as a physio in a range of areas. Students were really engaged and asked lots of questions at the end of the presentation. A huge thank you to Gill for taking the time out to come and speak with our students.

## **GEOGRAPHY FIELD TRIPS!**






Our BFS geographers have engaged in several field trips including a sixth form residential to develop geographical fieldwork skills.
