Remember, school returns on Wednesday 3 January - early this year!



7. How good is student behaviour in our school?




9. During the past year, how regularly has your child engaged in after school activities?

2. How would you rate your child's overall experience in school at the moment?




4. How safe do you feel your child is in school?




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Year 12, alongside many of our Year 13s, have also begun volunteering in one of over 40 different activities - from reading with Year 6 students in local primaries, to coaching extra-curricular sports teams, to mentoring Year 11 students who need revision support. It is always such a joy to see students give back to the wider school community in this way. Year 12 students will next have their January Assessments which will be the first indication of the progress that they are making in their subjects and their first opportunity to sit extended papers and receive detailed feedback - good luck to you in your revision!

Similarly, Year 13 students have impressed us with their resilience, determination and consistency at the start of this very important year. Students have recently been concentrating on their mock exams and on submitting their university and apprenticeship applications. Students are applying for a diverse range of courses (from Medicine to Mechanical Engineering to Environmental Science) at a range of local and far-flung destinations (from Southampton to York to Boston (US)). A few students have also been offered interviews on the early-entry courses at Oxbridge universities and for Medicine and Veterinary Medicine.

In terms of trips, Year 13 Geography students have recently completed their 5-day fieldwork to Slapton Sands, Year 12 and Year 13 English students have attended the Poems of the Decade Conference in London, Religion and Philosophy students have listened to speeches at Worcester Cathedral, Food and Nutrition students have attended a one-day conference and a group of Sixth Form Science students have completed a residential trip to Cern. We are looking forward to a wide range of trips planned for later in the year.

BFS Student Voice

Benjamin Zephaniah

Benjamin Obadiah Iqbal Zephaniah was a British writer, poet, and actor. He was born on 15 April 1958 and peacefully passed on the 7 December 2023 at the age of 65.

Bejamin was dyslexic and he attended an approved school but left aged 13, unable to read or write. He persevered and discovered his love for the written word.

Zephaniah was given an old, manual typewriter to begin his passion for writing.

Zephaniah's first piece of poetry to be published was 'Pen Rhythm.'

Zephaniah has said that his mission was to fight the dead image of poetry in academia, and to "take it everywhere" to people who do not read books.

He turned poetry readings into concert-like performances.



He began performing at demonstrations, youth gatherings and outside police stations. "I was a big protester, not just against racism but also apartheid. We are a multicultural society, but the institutions must catch up with us," he said in 2019.

His poetry often directly responded to historical and current events. His second poetry collection, 'The Dread Affair', was published in 1985 and featured several poems attacking the British legal system.



His influence on young people's minds is huge and will be remembered with his poetry works and novels at BFS.

He was known all over the world for his creative talents. He released several collections including 'Talking Turkeys', 'Inna Liverpool' and 'School's Out'.

Turning his attention to acting, Zephaniah also played the role of Jeremiah "Jimmy" Jesus in 'Peaky Blinders', appearing in 14 episodes. Upon hearing the news of his death, costar Cillian Murphy said that he was "so saddened" by this news, adding: "Benjamin was a truly gifted and beautiful human being – a generational poet, writer, musician and activist. A proud Brummie and a Peaky Blinder."

Students from all around the world participated in Bebras Competition this year. More than 87000 students participated in Junior category, 155000 in Inter category, 29000 and 10000 students participated in seniors and elite category respectively in the UK.

Face-to-face Routes into STEM 2023/24

Routes into STEM is an experience that provides an amazing opportunity to help students understand the different routes to further STEM education and career pathways.

Who is it for?

Students in Year 9 and 10 who are interested in finding out more about STEM careers. Students should also be within one-hour of travel distance of locations.

What is involved?

- A three-day local experience that includes a day in a college, a day in a university and a day at a STEM company local to them
- Students will explore STEM careers, participate in interactive workshops, site tours and hear from young professionals

What are the outcomes?

- Gain first-hand information and experience hands on activities at STEM educational providers and companies to make informed decisions about their future
- Go on campus tours and get thinking about future studies in a mature and informed manner
- Speak with apprentices/graduates about their experiences
- Develop valuable skills such as presentation skills, team-building, and social skills, and see how they can be applied to their CV, Application Form or Personal Statement
