EMPLOYER TALKS

This morning we welcomed Sharon and Jenora from Burges Salmon to talk about their roles in the company. Sharon talked about her journey into her current role as a Legal Team PA in the client support team which included moving through other roles such as PA for the Head of Finance and Chief Operations Officer. She described a typical day in her role which includes attending and taking minutes during meetings, producing documents and billings reports, arranging travel and coaching junior staff. She talked through a range of skills uses in her role including attention to detail, organisation, and communication. She finished by giving advice about how to pursue roles at Burges Salmon, including having an updated CV and applying for a variety of roles or apprenticeships in business services which helps students gain experience in a range of departments, especially helpful for those who are unsure of the area they want to work in. Jenora then talked about her role as a Trainee Solicitor, which she started in August last year. She described how over the next two years she will work in 6 different areas of the business to gain experience, including banking, construction and engineering, and real estate and family. Both Sharon and Jenora talked about the wide range of social and community opportunities available at Burges Salmon, including sports teams and events such as 'Burges Salmon's Got Talent'. Students were advised to look at their website to find out about opportunities for work experience.



MISS COLEMAN






YEAR 8 FRENCH

Year 8 French have been studying the use of past tense in recent lessons and building on their knowledge of avoir and past participles. The exercise they completed in this week's lessons practised error correction, which is often quite hard to do but they showed excellent perseverance and resilience in analysing what the mistakes were in the past tense text. They also spoke with their partner to describe their own recent holiday and many of them said "j'ai mangé du chocolat".



YEAR 9 FRENCH





Students completed a writing key task in their lesson to end their study of module 1 – J'adore les Fêtes! Students wrote about their favourite festival or celebration, what they are going to eat for their birthday, and what they usually buy at the market. Year 9 students have been working very hard in class and revising vocabulary at home and have produced high level writing using different tenses. Bravo!

YEAR 9 SPANISH

While studying the topic of el trabajo (work and careers), students used the verb soy (I am) and an adjective to describe their personalities for suitable jobs. They played a battleships game to form spoken sentences using a variety of adjectives. Students enjoyed this activity with its competitive element, as well as practising their cognitive oracy strand. In other lessons they have been completing tangled translations (choosing to translate a mixed paragraph into either Spanish or English) and talking about typical days at work in three tenses. ¡Bien hecho!



YEAR 11 SPANISH



environmental impact


Year 11 have begun their final module of study, which is all related to the environment and considering the most serious global issues facing us. In this week's lesson, they have been focussing on reading and listening to exam-style questions, as well as translating sentences into Spanish using a new more complex vocabulary. They have also looked at local issues and considered their own responsibility to help the environment through recycling and unplugging electronic devices when not being used. We watched a parody of the song Despacito all about recycling properly to embed key vocabulary in



This week in A-Level French, we discussed common errors made during the mocks and strategies to avoid similar mistakes in future assessments. The students also completed a variety of tasks (reading comprehension, listening activities, manipulating vocabulary and writing), which are often under time constraint to support their exam time management. The students also worked collaboratively to organise and prepare a speaking presentation.

They both presented their work beautifully, with the most amazing French accents! We also listened to a Canadian song (in French) together, as students are currently studying francophone music.
