


Mrs King's three tips for life beyond BFS:






Folly Farm

Our recent Year 12 trip to Folly Farm was an incredible adventure celebrating biodiversity, ecology, and hands-on learning. The students immersed themselves in nature, gaining valuable insights into the ecosystems and wildlife of Chew Valley.

Students delved into the fascinating world of freshwater ecosystems, participating in pond sweeping activities, using nets and identification guides to discover and study the diverse array of aquatic organisms. A particular highlight was finding great crested newts! Students also used a range of sampling techniques to investigate grassland and woodland habitats.




BFS COMPUTER SCIENCE

Creative iMedia



It's been a busy year in Creative iMedia. Year 10 students have been working hard in this computer-based design course. The mandatory coursework unit we completed in April/May was based on creating a visual identity and digital graphic product. Students used PowerPoint and Photoshop to plan and create a logo and loading screen for a gaming company. Students are now learning the skills for the next coursework unit in which they will create an interactive digital media project. Using the software Rocketcake, Students are learning to link pages, create navigation bars and display audio, image and video files, to create an interactive website for 'Rejuice' smoothie company.



Harry Potter Studios

Year 10 Design and Technology students took what I think can be now classed as our annual pilgrimage to Warner Brothers Studios to tour the Harry Potter sets. As much fun as the trip was, it was awe-inspiring to see the sets and learn about all the design considerations that went into each one, from how to keep floating candles alight to the mechanisms in moving parts. We started our visit by attending an exclusive class in textile distressing. Who would have thought one of the jackets worn by Daniel Radcliffe's character had over 60 versions that increased in its state of distress according to the requirements of the scenes, and that the garmen worn by Voldemort was so long that Ralph Fiennes had to stand on stilt-like structures and had to have a shorter version for action scenes! Even the cones in the car park were 'wizardy' in design! My favourite part was the last section that documented technical drawings, scale models and concept boards - real life examples of designers at work. Utter magic!









Oracy Pioneers



Superb Work from our Oracy Pioneers, Caila, Jaydon and Ayesha from Year 9 who have been taking part in the Oracy Pioneers programme this year. They have been working with groups of Year 7 students to develop their oracy skills during tutor time with great success. The culmination of the programme took place on Tuesday when Caila, Jaydon and Ayesha gave a presentation to a group of (mainly older) students from other schools across the Bristol Education Partnership. All three faced their nerves around public speaking and gave a clear, relatable and insightful presentation on the benefits and challenges of the Oracy Pioneers programme. 

The Three-Body Problem by Cixin Liu Review by Esther, Y7





Rutherford Appleton Laboratory Physics Trip

Not having run since 2019, the Harwell Open Week at the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory, is a chance for schools and the public to get a rare glimpse behind the scenes of cutting-edge research in UK Physics. On Wednesday of this week, we took a group of Year 8 and Year 12 students to visit the site and take part in a tour and activities about gravitational waves, atomic level materials study, coding programming, plus the most powerful laser in the UK!



Boundless energy from both staff and students meant the day was enjoyed by all, with particular highlights in the morning being Sophie L saying how much she loved using binary to code on 'double computers', Mr Milstead touching the oldest artifact on Earth (a hefty piece of iron) and learning the material science behind gravitational wave detection.







Everyone loved the Wonder Marquee, collecting the obligatory free pencils, trying on Cosmonaut helmets and gloves and having a go on an F1 Williams Racing simulator. Enlightened after such a great day of Physics learning, we went on a final tour of the Vulcan laser facility and the most precise machine shop in Europe, receiving personalised aluminium Lego blocks as souvenirs!

Finally, after a super (and very hot) day out, our group of fab Physicists headed back to BFS, full of ideas and inspiration!



School Attendance: The law is changing

From 19th August 2024

Penalty Notice Fines for School Attendance are changing

The government is introducing a new National Framework for Penalty Notices

5 days of unauthorised absence

Penalty Notice fines may be issued for any term-time absences that are unauthorised (for example, a 5-day term-time holiday) - whether these absences are taken consecutively or cumulatively over a rolling period of 10 school weeks

10 sessions of unauthorised absence in any 10-week period

Penalty Notice fines will also be considered when there have been 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in any rolling period of 10 school weeks

> A school day has 2 sessions: 1 morning and 1 afternoon session per day

A school week means any week in which there is at least one school session. The threshold can be met with any combination of unauthorised absence (e.g. 6 sessions of holiday plus 4 sessions of arriving late after the register closes all within 10 school weeks). These sessions can be consecutive (e.g. 10 sessions of holiday in one week) or not (e.g. 6 sessions of unauthorised absence taken in 1 week and 1 per week for the next 4 weeks). The period of 10 school weeks can also span different terms or school years (e.g. 2 sessions of unauthorised absence in the Summer Term and a further 8 within the Autumn Term).

What is a Penalty Notice?

A Penalty Notice is an out of court settlement which is intended to change behaviour without the need for criminal prosecution. If repeated penalty notices are being issued and they are not working to change behaviour they are unlikely to be most appropriate tool. Therefore, from August 2024, only 2 Penalty Notices can be issued to the same parent in respect of the same child within a 3-year rolling period and any second Penalty Notice within that period is charged at a higher rate. Any further offences may result in criminal prosecution.

The law will be clear that where a Penalty Notice threshold is met – in each individual case, the school **must** consider if a Penalty Notice is appropriate

First Offence

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for a Term-Time Leave of Absence or irregular attendance, the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child (if paid within 28 days)

Reduced to: £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days

Second Offence (in a 3-year rolling period)

The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for a Term-Time Leave of Absence or irregular attendance to the **same parent** for the **same child** the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child (if paid within 28 days)

There is no reduction in the amount.

<u>Third Offence or Any Further Offences</u> (in a 3-year rolling period)

The third time an offence is committed for a Term-Time
Leave of Absence or irregular attendance by the same parent
for the same child (including those by other Local
Authorities) a Penalty Notice will NOT be issued but will be
referred to Bristol City Council's Education Welfare service
for Prosecution which may result in fines of upto £2,500 per
parent, per child.

Cases found guilty in a Magistrate's Court can show on a parent's future DBS certificate.

Bristol City Council have the discretion to issue Penalty
Notice fines before the above threshold is met in cases
where parents are deliberately avoiding the national
threshold by taking several term time holidays below the
threshold, or for repeated absences for birthdays or other
family events.

Unchanged

Penalty Notice fines are issued **Per Parent, Per child**. This means that fines are issued to each parent, for each child who is absent. For example: If 2 siblings are absent for a term-time holiday this will result in each parent receiving 2 separate fines.

Staff and Governors at BFS are determined to ensure that every student at our school has access to an enriched education with inspiring curricular and extra-curricular opportunities. Through our BFS Promise, we offer a huge range of additional opportunities for all our students as they progress through the school.

Funding in schools has been under increasing pressure for several years now and we work tirelessly, with less resources, to provide the best possible experiences for your children. It is increasingly challenging to continue to deliver and improve on the additional experiences and opportunities we offer.





With this in mind, we are re-launching the BFS Fund to help us provide some of those extras that make all the difference to school life, that we otherwise may not afford. BFS fund will go towards improving our school environment and sustaining our wide range of extracurricular and enrichment activities.

Initiatives include:

- Improvement of social spaces e.g. landscaping and outdoor furniture and equipment for social times
- Grounds development projects such as sports spaces and outside environmental classroom/garden
- Collapsed curriculum days and visiting agencies

- Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) activities
