4. Answer the Speaking Questions below in French and bring them to the first lesson to discuss.

2. La politique en France
3. L'histoire de la France
4. La musique ou le cinéma

Speaking Questions :

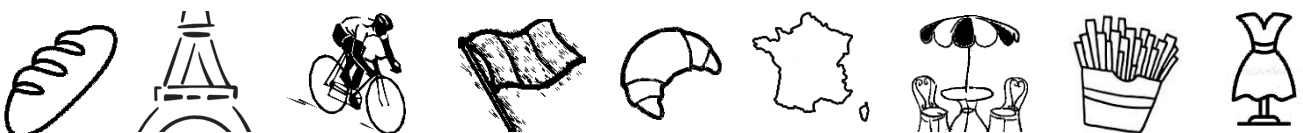
1. Que vas-tu vas faire ce week-end avec ta famille/tes ami(e)s ?

2. Listen to music in French on Youtube or Spotify. Use www.genius.com to research the lyrics and translate a few passages you find interesting. Here are some suggested artists: Fréro Delavega, Amel Bent, CoJane, Indila, Louane, Stromae, Kenji Girac, Zaz, Soolking, Maître Gims, Angèle, Dadju.
